FOURTH TEACHER FOR CENTRE HALL HIGH SCHOOL

at Monday Night's Session. --Means Little Extra Cost to Borough.

The Centre Hall school board, at regular meeting on Monday night passed a resolution t add the fourth eacher to the High school teaching staff. Just who this teacher shall be was not decided at the meeting.

That there is need of a fourth teacher in the High school is admitted. The school is growing in enrollment yearly and may be expected to reach one hundred pupils by next year.

The addition of the fourth teacher saddles very little extra burden on the taxpayers. The school district will thus come into the class where the State pays 75 per centum of the minimum salary, which in the High schoo! is \$130 per month. This classification is based on the true valuation of prop erty. Where the true valuation per teacher of assessable property is \$50. 000 or less, the reimbursement by the State is made ona basis of 75 per cent. of the annual minimum salary for teachers in fourth-class districts, in which class is Centre Hall borough. In addition to the State's paying the bulk of the extra teacher's salary, outside districts sending pupils to the school will also be obliged to carry a part of the expense, so that the local district can ill afford not to seize the opportunity to give its boys and girls the bet r educational advantages to be derived through an additional teacher which means more individual attention on the part of the teacher to pupil.
