The child was aged one year and five months. Funeral services will be held this (Thursday) afternoon at 2:30, and interment made in the Pleasant Gap cemetery.

WISE.—Henry Hemigh Wise, aged 88 years, died at the home of his son, Robert B. Wise, of Wilkensburg. He was born near Woodward, but moved with his parents to Clinton county when about a year old. He had lived in or near Loganton nearly all his life up to five years ago when he went to live with his son.

He is survived by four sons, Robert B., of Wilkensburg; Charles and Richard, of Pittsburg; Preston E. Wise, of Loganton, and one daughter, Mr. Ella Taylor, of Eminton. Funeral services were held in the Evangelical church at Loganton. Rev. A. C. Paulhamus officiated and interment was made in Fairview cemetery.

LEATHERS.—Mrs. Verna Leathers, wife of Theodore Leathers, died at her home at Howard, following a lingering illness. She was a daughter of Roland and Ann Bryan and was born at Curtin on September 7th, 1878, hence was in her 60th year. Surviving her are her husband and two sons, Lester and Bryan Leathers, both of Howard. She also leaves four brothers and a sister, John Bryan, of Eagleview; George, of Howard; Orlando and Irvin, of Williamsport, and Mrs. Harry Lose, of Philadelphia. Burial was made in the Curtin cemetery.

WILLIAMS.—John Harvey Williams, well known resident of Ferguson township, died quite suddenly and unexpectedly at his home at Pine Grove Mills, Saturday a week. He went to work as usual that morning, cheerful as ever, but about eleven o'clock he experienced an attack of neuralgia of the heart. Instead of passing away the pain became more intense and though medical aid was administered he grew rapidly worse until the end.

Mr. Williams was a son of Ephraim and Matilda Runkle Williams and was born at the old stone mill, south of Centre Hall, in 1859, at his death being 68 years and 6 months old. As a young man he learned the trade of a saddler, an occupation he followed in the village of Lemont a number of years. Eventually he turned his attention to farming, starting out in Penns Valley and ending up on the Snyder farm in Ferguson township. After tilling the soil for twenty years he retired in 1919 and moving to Pine Grove Mills resumed his trade as a saddler, having built up a nice and lucrative business. Mr. Williams was twice married. His first wife having been Miss Anna E. Wooster whom he married in 1883. She died three years later, leaving one son, Clade Williams. In 1889 he married Miss Ida May Miller, who survives with the following children: Claude Williams, of Pine Grove Mills; Ray, of Oak Hall, and Fred, of Clearfield. He also leaves two brothers and two sisters, Mrs. William Brown, of Huntington; Mrs. J. C. Sholl and Thomas Williams, of Altoona, and Clayton, in California. Interment was made at Pine Grove Mills.

Confused Boy Dies.

Becoming confused as he was walking over the main highway en route home from school, Raymond Residence 7, of Milesburg, was struck by an automobile bearing Ogle Besene plates on Tuesday. He suffered injuries which caused his death en route to the Centre County Hospital.

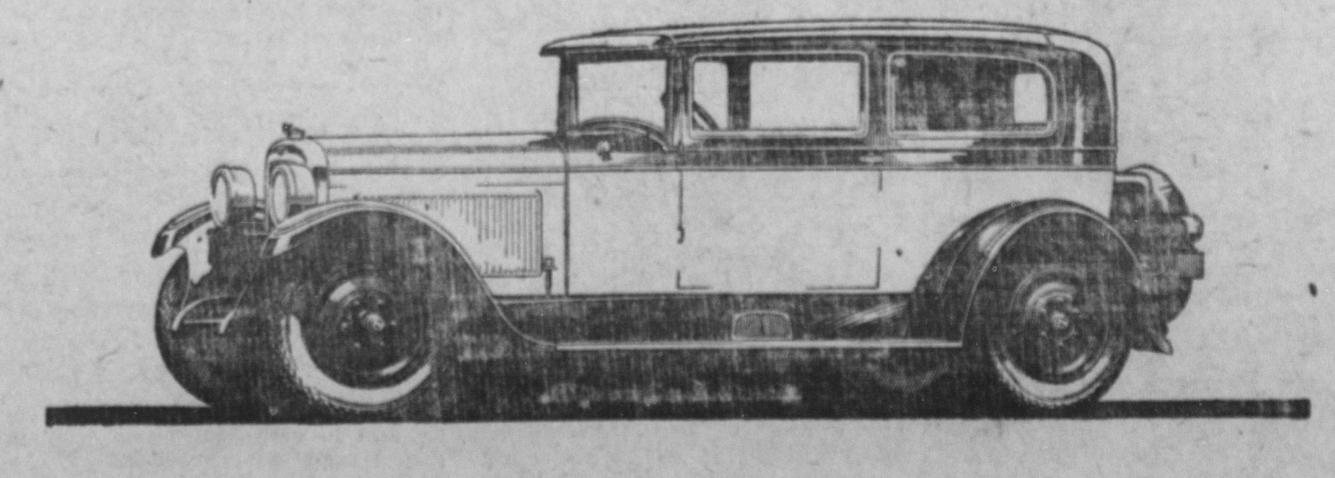
