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NEAR EAST RELIEF IN LAST BIG DRIVE

Centre County Will Endeavor to Do Its Full Share.



The board of trustees of the Near East Relief has authorized a money raising campaign to meet its entire financial obligation, which is fixed at \$5,000,000.

These institutions became great educational organizations without equal or precedent anywhere in the world.

But it was recognized from the start that the best place for a child is in a home, rather than an institution.

The orphanage side of this humanitarian enterprise is now nearing its completion. A total of 132,600 orphan children have passed through its institutions.

It is recognized that American honor is involved in the proper completion of this work.

Our total budget of \$5,000,000 has been determined on the basis of a careful detailed study of the number of years each will require to carry out the policy that every child shall be self-supporting at the age of sixteen.

Last year the work of Near East Relief cost more than \$3,000,000 which was given by voluntary contributions from every State in the Union.

An increase of 100 per cent in these contributions within the next two years will enable the organization to complete its entire orphanage commitments and carry its work of education and training to an adequate conclusion.

The early work of Near East Relief, which was largely emergency feeding of the refugees, has evolved into an educational and child welfare enterprise of unprecedented proportions.

As a result of its early work for refugees, the American relief workers found themselves with more than 100,000 orphan children who had been rescued in Armenia, Persia, Syria, Turkey, Palestine and Greece.
