

**GREATER SAFETY FOR DRIVERS ON ALTOONA TRACK**

Major Precautions to Be Taken to Prevent Tragic Deaths of Any of the Famous Pilots.

The reputation of the Altoona speedway as the most dangerous race course in the world resulted in an edict from the contest board of the American Automobile Association that major safety precautions must be taken to prevent the tragic death of any of the famous pilots in the 200-mile championship classic on June 16.

With practically every major event on the celebrated bowl marked by some disaster, with two of the most daring drivers—Howdy Wilcox and Joe Boyer—losing their lives, the speedway management was urged to intensify the rigid precautions always made before each great speed duel.

Doing their utmost to protect the drivers, the speedway has placed a corps of inspectors to follow the army of workmen making the customary spring replacements in the steeply-banked curves where the winter frosts have sprung the smooth board deck even as much as a quarter-inch out of line.

The miraculous escape last year of the veteran Dave Lewis, who crawled unhurt from the tangled wreckage of his costly front-drive car after it reared and turned over while traveling at 130 miles an hour, and the breath-taking skid down the entire length of the huge main grandstand by Ralph Hepburn, the former world's motorcycle champion, caused more than a score of spectators to faint from excitement.

The continuous cycle of narrow escapes, fearful skids and sickening lunges of the cars in last year's classic is still the main topic of conversation among the rail birds, who are already gathering at the fleets of trucks and tractors hauling materials into position and the crews of workmen clamoring over the massive mite and a quarter bowl.
