MAY TERM OF COURT.

Third Week of Term Annulled—Judge Chase to Hear Five Cases. May term of court opened on Monday morning with the Honorable M. Ward Fleming on the Bench and the officers in their places.

A considerable portion of the morning session was occupied in hearing motions and petitions and taking returns. The civil list for the three weeks' court was then gone over and the following cases disposed of for the present week:

Isaac Underwood vs. Burdine Butler; being an appeal, continued, as no plaintiff's statement had been filed.

Mrs. E. J. Eckenroth vs. Sid Bernstein; being an appeal; settled.

The Court stated that during the week beginning May 28th, the Honorable A. R. Chase of Clearfield court, would preside in five different cases as special to Judge Fleming.

The first case for the present week to occupy the attention of the Court was Comm. vs. Maggie Crawford and Newton Crawford, Prosecutors, Mary M. Williams and Anna C. Grose. This case came before the Court on a motion to quash the indictment for duplicity. The indictment quashed.

Comm. vs. Charles A. Weber and W. A. Springer, Prosecutors, J. Clyde Johnson. This case is in Bellefonte and grows out of according to the testimony of the Commonwealth, an attempt by the defendants to break into the prosecutor's store on South Water St. on the night of May 7. Verdict of guilty.

The third week of Court to begin June 4, was then annulled because of the first eight cases having to be continued by reason of amendments to be made to plaintiff's statements, which left but four cases, and the Court annulled the whole week's term.

Court adjourned for the week on Tuesday evening.

SEVERE HAIL STORM IN LOWER PENNS VALLEY

Rain and Hail Do Much Damage in Gregg, Penn and Haines Townships.

A rain and hail storm, the like of which had never been experienced heretofore in Gregg, Penn and Haines townships, passed over that section Tuesday evening between 5:00 and 6:00 o'clock. Hail in large quantities fell, and many of them were so large that their description suggested exaggeration. Many small buildings were toppled over and in some cases carried away and totally destroyed. Fences and small bridges were blown over or washed out.

Roland Zettle, tenant on the Dr. C. F. Smith farm at Penn Hall, was a heavy loser through the freaks of the storm. A colony house in which there were 203 young chickens was carried away, and was not found that night. The pig pen and a pig were also carried away—the pig having drowned.

Charles Shook had his car standing to the front of Prof. Hosterman's house, and the rising waters carried it away from some distance, the car coming to rest in a farmer's barnyard. Further east the destruction was similar, but no definite information has been received.

From a point a short distance west of Spring Mills no rain fell.

Yarnell Barn Burned.

The barn on the farm owned and occupied by Irvin Yarnell, about one mile west of Hubersburg, was struck by lightning on Monday afternoon and totally burned to the foundation. No stock was burned. The owner is a brother of ex-Sheriff Yarnell.
