

**72ND REFORMED CLASSIS
MET IN LEWISTOWN**

1929 Session to Meet in Williamsport
—6,556 Members Represented by
Body.

The 72nd annual session of the West-Susquehanna Classis of the Reformed Church was held in the new church in Lewistown, last week. At the closing session on Wednesday evening, it was decided to hold the 73rd annual sessions in Saint John's Reformed church, Williamsport, beginning May 13, 1929.

Delegates to the General Synod, which will hold its 23rd triennial sessions in Indianapolis, Ind., during the month of May, 1929, were elected as follows: Delegates primary, Rev. Dr. F. A. Ruppel, Lewistown; Rev. Robert Thoma, Bellefonte; Rev. Wm. E. Harr, Lock Haven; delegates second, Rev. Wm. C. Rittenhouse, Williamsport; Rev. Henry H. Rupp, Lewisburg; Rev. Wm. C. Slough, Womelsdorf.

Rev. W. C. Slough, formerly pastor of New Berlin charge and now director of education at Bethany Orphans' Home, Womelsdorf, near Reading, was elected as the new president of the Classis.

Throughout the past year there was added to the Sustentation or Pension Fund, \$80,329 in cash. In the Synod's 876 congregations out of a total of 1735 made contributions toward the campaign. The average contributions of these 876 congregations was \$227.56 at the end of 1927. The amount thus far pledged is approximately \$475,000, and the amount promised but not pledged, \$400,000, making a total of \$875,000.

Licentiate A. S. Asendorf of Baltimore, was received and enrolled as a member, and a call to him to become pastor of Faith Reformed church, State College, was confirmed. The Revs. W. W. Moyer of Boalsburg, and Robert Thoma, of Bellefonte, were appointed a committee to ordain the young man.

There are 60 Sunday schools of the 62 church congregations of the Classis. The total membership of the 60 schools is 9,285 persons, the net loss for the year being 169 members.

During the last year the benevolent money contributions of the 62 congregations were as follows: For home missions, \$7,263; for foreign missions, \$7,009; for educational work, \$3,453; for ministerial relief, \$3,902; for orphans' homes, \$1,214; for other denominational purposes, \$2,256; for benevolent purposes outside the Reformed Church, \$1,378; total of all benevolences of the Classis, \$26,613, a net decrease of \$69 during the last twelve months.

The total of contributions for all congregational purposes during the last year was \$75,541, or net decrease of \$738 during the last year, compared with the preceding year.

The total value of the church property of the 62 congregations is \$814,200 or \$151,600 more than it was one year ago.

The total value of the church parsonages of the classis is \$120,000 or a gain of \$1,000 made during the year.

The total indebtedness on all the church properties of the Classis is \$146,283, of which \$85,453 is in debts on the church buildings at State College and in Lewistown, with \$64,000 on the new Lewistown church edifice dedicated during the present month.

W. A. Lambert, of Rebersburg, having completed his theological studies at the Reformed Seminary at Lancaster, and Franklin and Marshall College, applied for and was granted a license to preach the Gospel in order that he might accept a call to the Fairview charge of the Gettysburg Classis.

FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

SET OUT SUMMER BULBS—All the summer flowering bulbs may be set out now. To assure a continuous supply of gladioli, they can be set at intervals of two weeks. Follow the rule of planting all bulbs twice as deep as their diameter.

SPRAY FOR PROFITS—Be sure to spray your potatoes this summer. The practice is no longer experimental. Hundreds of farmers have sprayed and experienced a comfortable filling of their pocketbooks as a result. It pays to protect a crop after it is planted so that the harvest will not be fruitless and disappointing.

CONTROL EARTHWORMS—If earthworms are troublesome in the lawn, saturate the ground with a solution of lime. Use 20 pounds of stone lime to 40 gallons of water. Allow the solution to stand until clear and then apply the clear liquid to the turf.

TRY LOCUST FOR POSTS—Black locust is an ideal tree for growing fence posts. If your supply is getting short, try an acre. State College foresters suggest.

ATTACKS MANY PLANTS—More than 200 plants are known to be acceptable hosts to the European corn borer. These include all kinds of succulent plants and some, like the grapevine, which is not considered ordinarily as succulent. This shows how serious the corn borer menace is and why it is important to have adequate control every year.

MAKES FINE HONEY—Sweet clover is considered one of the best honey-producing plants. The plants bloom abundantly and the bees are very fond of the nectar. Sweet clover honey is of the highest quality.

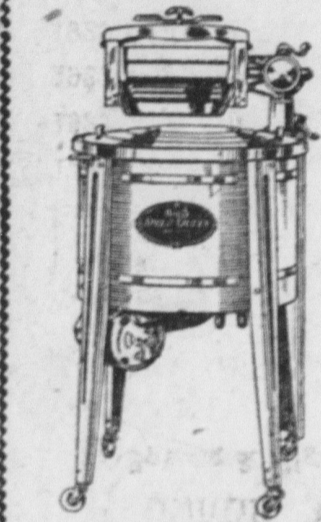

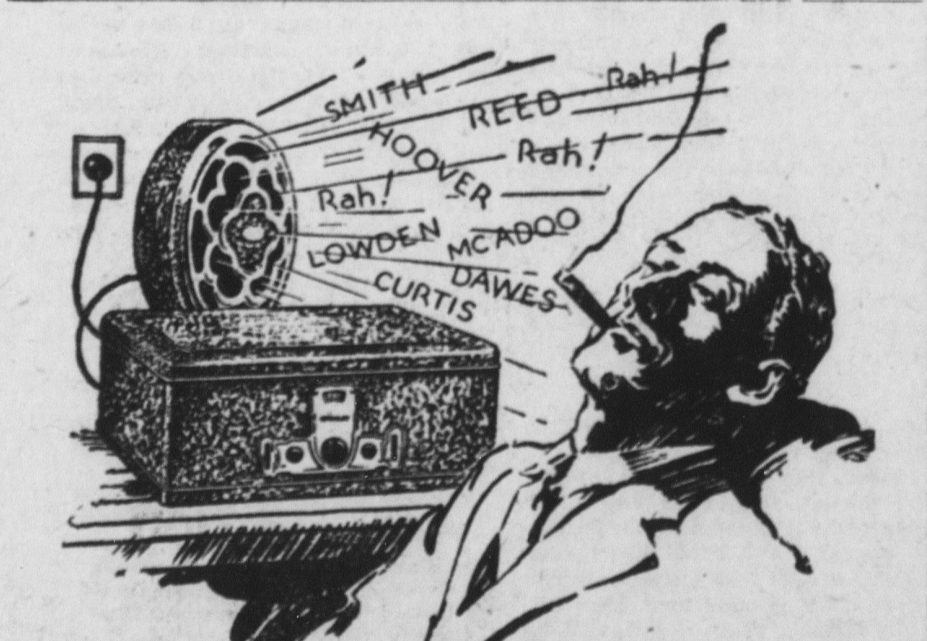
