WEBER—George M. Weber, aged 75, died at Lock Haven at his home, after an illness of about two weeks was born at Rebersburg and removed to Lock Haven with his family about 30 years ago. He was engaged as a contracting carpenter. Mr. Weber was a member of the Fraternal Order of Eagles. He is survived by his wife, six sons and three daughters: S. M. Weber, of Washington, D. C.; Mrs. W. W. Conig, of Cleveland, Ohio; Mrs. Lewis H. Poorman, of Castana, and Harry V. Joseph E., Lester S., Glenn L., Arthur N., and Mrs. Thomas K. McClellan, all of Lock Haven; also by two brothers and three sisters: Henry, of Emporium; Newton, of Rebersburg; Mrs. John Gable, of Los Angeles, Cal.; and Mrs. Harry Doebler and Mrs. James Shiffer, of Williamsport. Burial was made in Cedar Hill cemetery, Lock Haven.

TATE—Miss Alice Priscilla Tate, former registrar of vital statistics in Bellefonte, and for the past year a guest at the Methodist Home for the Aged at Tyrone, died there a few days ago. Miss Tate received a broken hip in a fall and was removed to the hospital for treatment, but failed to respond. She was born in Bellefonte and was a daughter of George and Belle Hall Tate, both of whom are dead. She was aged about 75 years. For many years she made her home in Bellefonte with her aunt, Mrs. Priscilla Bell, who died several years ago. About a year ago Miss Tate went to the Methodist Home at Tyrone. The remains were brought to Bellefonte for interment in the Union cemetery.

SHUEY—Charles Shuey, a well known resident of Benner township who resided near Rock, died at the Centre County Hospital of gangrene and heart trouble. An infection of the foot caused his removal to the hospital for treatment. He was a native of Pleasant Gap and was aged 62 years. His parents were Frank and Susanna Shuey, both deceased. Mr. Shuey was never married. He is survived by the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. William Colpetzer, Mrs. Mark Hester, and James Shuey, of Buffalo Run; Mrs. Clyde Jackson, of State College; Henry Shuey, of Bellefonte; Mrs. John Colpetzer, of Fairbrook, and George of the Barrens. Funeral services were held by Rev. C. C. Shuey, of Bellefonte, a relative of the deceased.

COUNTY S. S. CONVENTION.

100th Anniversary of Sunday School Work Observed in Connection With County Gathering of S. S. Workers.

At Spring Mills on Monday and Tuesday was held the Centre County Sunday School Convention and in connection with it was celebrated the 100th anniversary of the organization of Sunday School work at that place.

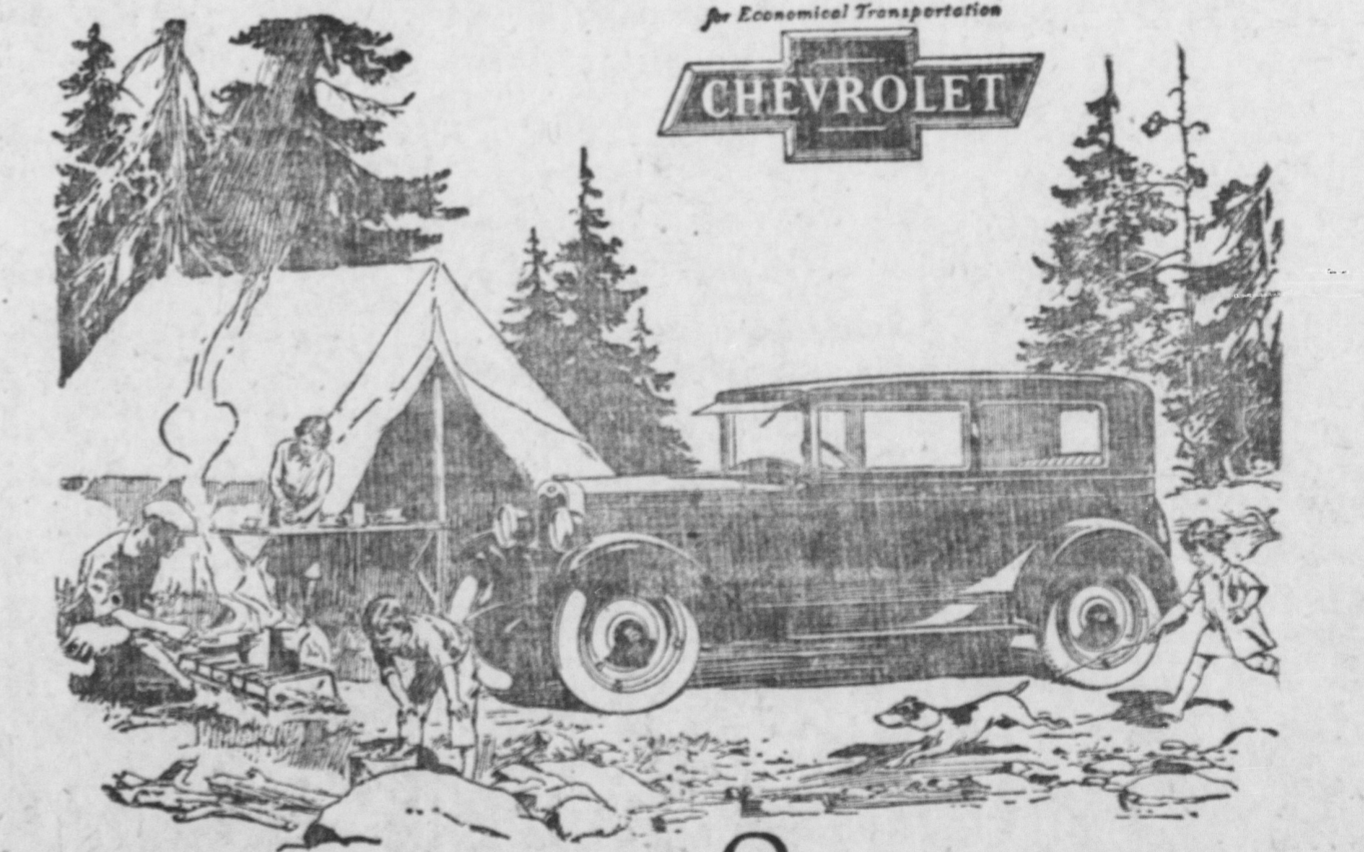
