**Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.**

**HOUSE POULTRY PROPERLY**—Proper housing of poultry is of vital importance in the success of poultry keeping. A house should be so designed that it can be economically constructed. It should provide for perfect protection from storms, afford sufficient sunshine during the winter months, give plenty of ventilation without drafts, and possess uniformity of temperature.

**ORDER TREES EARLY**—It is not too early for the farmer who intends to plant forest trees next spring to get in his order. The supply of some of the best species, such as red pine, black locust, black walnut, and a number of hardwood species, were allotted early the past year.

**TEST DAIRY COWS**—The wise dairyman knows whether he is keeping cows or the cows are keeping him. Cow testing associations help the farmer to determine the efficiency of his herd.

**PROMOTE EGG QUALITY**—Quality of eggs produced on the farm can be improved by marketing them at least twice a week in hot weather. The eggs should be kept in a dry, cool, well-ventilated place.

**TAKE CARE OF VINES**—Climbing vines need training and careful attention every few days in the early stages. This is particularly important with permanent hardy types.

**CUT ALFALFA EARLY**—Cut alfalfa when one-tenth to one-half of the plants are in bloom, say State College farm specialists. This is usually before many of the lower leaves fall and before the stems become hard and woody. At that time about 50 per cent of the plant is in the leaves.
