The building planned is to cost about \$250,000, and the Granges of the State have turned over \$100,000 of the amount to the college. President Ralph D. Hetzel presided at the exercises, witnessed by most of the 3000 visitors at the college for the annual Farmers' Day. Speakers included Philip H. Dewey, past master and chairman of the committee that selected the type of memorial building; Dr. Hanna Lyons, chairman of the Grange home economics commit-tee; Charles M. Gardner, National Grange officer, and Edward B. Dorsett State Master.
