State Highway News.

By the end of this month the State Highway Department will have let bids for 428 miles of construction work.

During the month of June, 1,596,458 gallons of bituminous material were applied on 549 miles of highways. The total number of employees in the Department of Highways on July 1st was 12,176, of which 3,323 were on a salaried basis and 8,847 on an hourly basis. The maintenance forces had a total of 8791 employees on the hourly basis. Of the 3323 salaried employees, 1859 are assigned to the field forces, including engineers, copsmen, draftsmen, inspectors and maintenance employees.

Union County Man Commits Suicide.

Some time Friday afternoon, George W. Wolfe, who resides near Keller Crossroads, a short distance from what is known as Sunrise school house, shot himself through the head with a shot gun. The top of his head was blown off.

Mr. Wolfe, who is a bachelor, aged about 49 years, seemed to be in his usual health and no cause is known for the act which ended his life.

An inquest was held Friday evening at Lewisburg, and it was decided that the death was a plain case of suicide.
