

LETTER FROM CAMP KANESATAKE

An interesting letter from Camp Kanestake, on Spruce Creek, is presented herewith:

Camp Kanestake, Spruce Creek, July 27, 1928.

Dear Friends: Camp is in full swing and before one realizes it will soon be over. Nevertheless, I'm sure the spirit of Kanestake will linger with each one here forever.

There are 250 persons here with the leaders. It sure is some bunch and things move right along and the noise we make in the dining room is enough to raise the roof. Of course, we don't make all noise either, as we eat!

Until today we have had wonderful weather, and that made camp more impressive. Our vesper services have been too great to be able to explain. It seems as though when we are gathered together on the hillside and all in silence that God is speaking. Even the birds gather to listen, the trees stand upright, and all nature is at its height. Then the speakers have brought us great inspiration, and especially Kitty Holsope. She is a missionary from India who had to return on account of her health. Her lectures always leave an impression of some good.

My classes this year are very interesting and I am sure will be helpful. They are: "Foundations of Christian Belief," by Rev. Norman Clemens, who is a young minister; "How to Teach Religion," by Miss Elsie Rodgers, who is superintendent of Children's Division; "Pageantry and Dramatics in Religion," by Miss Rodgers; "Modern Church," by Rev. Stevenson. The second and third courses named are credit courses and one hour class and one hour study are required every day.

Thus far I have only discussed the spiritual and mental side of camp. There also is the social side. That is the meeting and making friends with different people. Of course we see our old friends from years back, but then there's the new friends. We are all like a big family with Tish Brown our mother. We don't need a formal introduction to get acquainted, but everyone knows everyone else. Real friendships are made at Kanestake because we are interested in the best of life.

Then there is the physical side. Many of us perhaps realize here that our bodies are temples and must be kept fit. We have games and swimming, hiking, etc. Of course for the first few days we all get stiff and sore, but before long they have us moving so fast that we forget all about that. I certainly am glad to be back this year and appreciate what has been done for me. I hope that I may always show my appreciation as one would want me to do.

This is the program: 8-15, reveille; 6-49, morning watch; 7-00, breakfast; 7-45, class; 8-50, class; 9-45, study; 10-40, assembly; 10-55, class and study; 12-00, dinner. 1-00, rest period; 1-30, class; 2-20, class; 3-20, games; 4-15, swimming; 5-30, supper; 8-15, Night's Devotions. Centre County Shows Deficit in Near East Relief Quota.

On July 1st, the amount raised by Centre county toward its quota of \$8861 for completing the work of Near East Relief was \$6161, leaving a deficit of \$2700. The districts which went over the top in their allotments of the quota were Unionville, Bostsburg and Bellefonte. Since a failure in any part will seriously affect the children under our care, and we have until June, 1929, to complete the quota, the county committee has decided to send out further appeals some time during the fall and winter. In the meantime the committee hopes that the chairmen in the districts which have not made their allotments will arrange for completing our share of what is to be the finest and largest piece of humanitarian construction work ever done in the world.

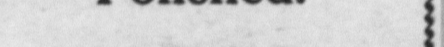
