DEATHS

KURTZ—John Frederick Kurtz, the last member of the Frederick Kurtz family, died at his home in Lewisburg, and Tuesday the remains were interred in a Lewisburg cemetery. He had been in a very serious physical condition for several months prior to his death, and was a Geisinger Memorial hospital patient for a number of weeks.

M. Kurtz was born in Centre Hall May 23, 1868, making his age 60 years, 3 months and 14 days. During the fall of 1926 he went from the Reporter office to Lewisburg to take charge of the Lewisburg Journal, owned by his brother, William E. Kurtz. After the death of his brother he purchased the Journal and conducted it for a number of years. During the Wilson administration he was appointed postmaster at Lewisburg, and he then sold his paper. Upon being relieved of the postmaster-ship he engaged in the sale of automobiles and conducted a garage in connection with that business.

BUTTORF—Edna Igene Buttorf, esteemed wife of John Buttorf, died at her home in Hartley township, near Millmont, in Union county, Wednesday afternoon of last week, at 4:15 o'clock. She had been ill for a period of five months, with a complication of diseases. She was a daughter of the late James and Mary Horner, and was born at Colyer, Centre county, July 2, 1886. She was a resident of Millfin county for many years. About sixteen years ago she and her husband moved to Union county and engaged in farming.

Mrs. Buttorf leaves to mourn her departure her husband and the following brothers and sisters: Willie Horner, of Altoona; Harvey Horner, Woodrich; Minnie Page, of Mill Hill; Elsie Stemm, of Coleville, and Bertha Bed-lyon, of Williamsburg. Funeral services over the remains were held from the late home on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. Interment was made in the Yeagertown cemetery at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. Rev. Robert Heckard, of Middleburg, conducted the services.

MEYER—Jacob W. Meyer, of Coburn, passed away at his home on Tuesday from an ailment of the heart. He was aged 81 years, 10 months, 23 days. He was a son of Philip and Magdaline (Stoner) Meyer, both long deceased. There survive him his wife, whose maiden name was Miss Susan; a Beahm, and two sons—Cyrus Meyer, Esq., Pittsburgh, and Mrs. C. F. Cornan, Coburn. Interment will be made on Friday.

PETTEROLF—Rev. R. F. Petterolf, of Seltsingrove, died very suddenly of heart failure. He got up and complained of not feeling well, called for a doctor and before the doctor arrived, he died. He was well known in this section, the home of his youth, and will be remembered as giving a very interesting address at the time of the Centre County Sunday School convention and 100th anniversary of Sunday school work that was held at Spring Mills on June 4th. He had been engaged in teaching school at different places in Union and Snyder counties for the last twenty-five years, and a Lutheran minister for a number of years previous to that time.

KEINSTEETTER—Mrs. Elizabeth May Kerstetter, wife of B. M. Kerstetter, of Lock Haven, died at her home after a long illness of a complication of diseases. She was born in Millheim, but had lived in Lock Haven the greater part of her life, and was well known in the work of St. John's Lutheran church of which she was a member. She is survived by her husband, and a daughter, Ruth, at home; and a sister, Mrs. Jessie Kramer, of Millheim. The funeral services were held at the residence Saturday afternoon, Rev. Curtis Stein, pastor of St. John's Lutheran church, officiating. Interment in Highland cemetery, Lock Haven.

TONNER—Alice, widow of John W. Tonner, and former resident of Bellefonte, died at Hot Springs, Virginia, aged somewhere in the seventies. Mrs. Tonner was the daughter of William Musser, of Millheim, where she grew to womanhood, and later moved to Bellefonte where her husband was connected with the Nittany Furnace. Surviving her is one son, Wm. Tonner, of Philadelphia, where the deceased had lived for the last twenty years. Burial was made at Millheim on Saturday morning. She is the last of the family—one sister, Aggie, wife of John Naugle, and brother, William, of Millheim, died years ago.

MORRISON—Mrs. Isabella Gamble Morrison, relict of Robert Morrison, died at her home in Bellefonte following a lingering illness with a complication of diseases, aged 92 years, 10 months and 13 days. The deceased, one of the oldest residents of Bellefonte, was born October 18, 1836, in county Donegal, Ireland. She was united in marriage with Robert Mor-

ison in 1853 and in 1892 the family came to the United States where they have since made their home. Surviving are the following sons and daughters: Mrs. Wm. Clark, Andrew, Robert, James, Alexander, Thomas, John and Mrs. H. B. Kerns, all of Bellefonte.

SWARTZ—G. Calvin Swartz, former Millheim resident, died at his farm home near Hickory Corner. He was found dead in bed by members of his family. Deceased was run over by a tractor some time ago and it is thought he was injured internally and that it caused his sudden demise.

Mr. and Mrs. Carl Bohn, of Akron, Ohio, are spending their vacation among friends in this vicinity.

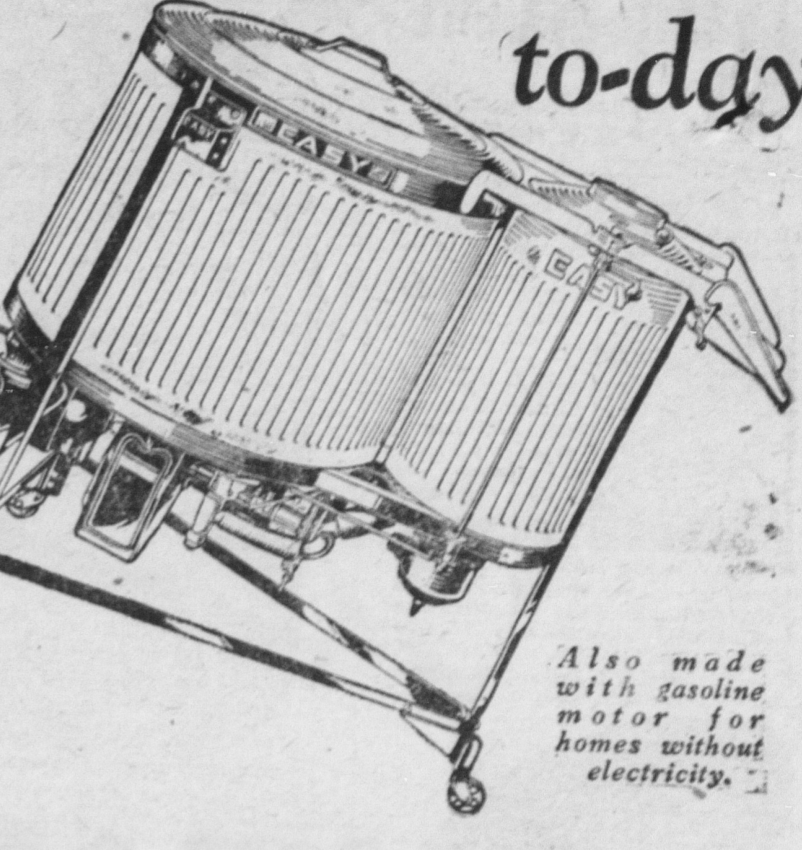
Mrs. George C. Hall was the guest of Mrs. Ellen Stuart at State College on Monday.
