FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

**Pick Seed from Field**--Select seed corn in the field. Pick only well-informed and matured ears from healthy, vigorous, well-rooted plants having green stalks and yellow husks. It is a good plan to pull twice as many ears as will be needed or planted. About 15 medium-sized ears will plant an acre.

**Good Job for Graduates**--Graduates of the school of agriculture at the Pennsylvania State College had little trouble in finding profitable positions this year. Ninety-six of the 199 June graduates had accepted offers before they received their diplomas. They are in agricultural or allied work and most of them are located in Pennsylvania.

**Grow Beef with Silage**--While silage was first used as a feed for dairy cattle it has been demonstrated in recent years that it has just as much value as a feed for fattening steers and beef breeding cows. It also is a satisfactory feed for breeding ewes and fattening lambs.

**House Pullets Early**--If pullets are to lay continuously after production starts, they must be put in the laying houses early. Give them a good chance to do their best.

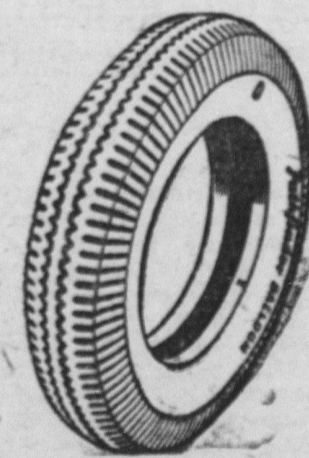
