At this critical moment, Dutch Bierly drove a beautiful double over the right field fence, scoring the two runs. Mallory reached first on an error, but was caught with too big a lead off the sack, ending the inning. Rebersburg threatened again in the seventh but Bill Tyson struck out with the bases full.

The veteran, Mallory, played a beautiful game in the field and delivered well at the bat. Dutch Bierly also collected three hits, one a double. Score:
