**FARM CALENDAR.**

**Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.**

**Prevent Weedy Flavor**—Where pastures are short at this time of the year and cows do not get enough supplementary feeds, they will eat many kinds of weeds. Among these are ragweed, goldenrod and pigweed, all of which cause off-flavored milk. Feed sufficient grain and roughage so that the cows will let the weeds alone.

**Use College Services**—"Farm relief" may come in taking full advantage of the opportunities offered by your State College. Do you get the bulletins and circulars? If not, send for a list of available publications. Do not forget the short courses offered and also get acquainted with the county agent.

**Good Farming Succeeds**—An agricultural college in another State says "there is more hope for the good farmer on poor land than for the poor farmer on good land." This is applicable to any state as many have frequently observed.

**Pack Fruit Attractively**—Growers find that they can get from 10 to 25 cents a bushel more for apples that are well packed instead of being just poured into the basket. Honestly packing a bushel of apples does not improve the flavor or value of the fruit but it makes a more attractive package.

**Keep Pullets Laying**—If pullets are to lay well all winter their body weight must be kept up. This can be done by feeding a good grain and some cod liver oil.

**Pick Seed Corn Now**—If seed corn is selected in the field it will insure a better crop next year than if the ears are picked out of the crib.

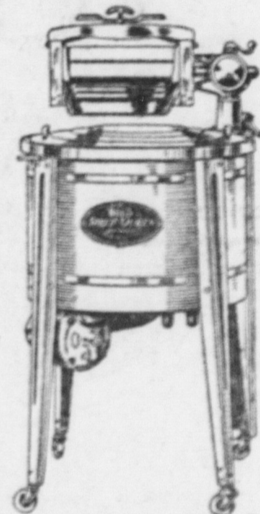

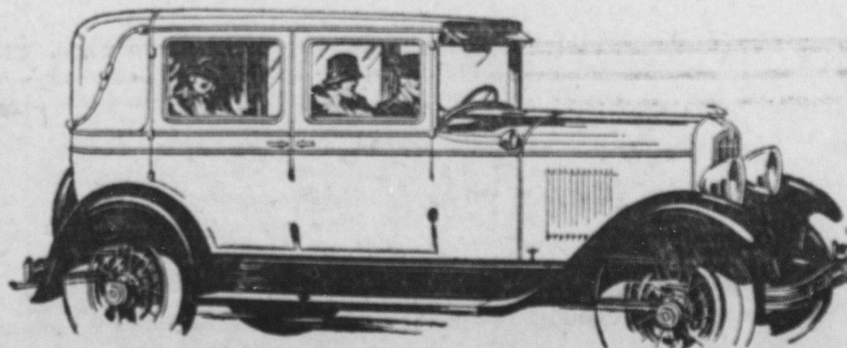
