AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE TRAFFIC OF MOTOR AND OTHER VEHICLES IN THE BOROUGH OF CENTRE HALL AND PROVIDING FOR FINES AND VIOLATION THEREOF.

Be it ordained and enacted by the Council of Centre Hall at a regular meeting thereof and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same: SECTION I.—That all vehicular and other traffic at the intersection of the public highway in said Borough, where the main thoroughfare intersects with Church Street at what is known as the Diamond in said Borough and where a stop light has been installed shall observe the following rules: No vehicular or other traffic on said streets shall cross said Diamond while said stop light exposes a red light facing the traffic; a right or left turn to another street may be made only on the exposure of a green light facing the traffic; and vehicular and other traffic may cross said Diamond only when a green light facing the traffic is exposed, and not otherwise.

SECTION II.—Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction for the first offence thereof, before the Burgess or a Justice of the Peace of said Borough be subject to a fine of not less than Two and One-Half (\$2.50) Dollars, nor more than Five (\$5.00) Dollars, and costs, for each offence, at the discretion of the said Burgess or Justice of the Peace, and in default of the payment of such fine and costs shall be imprisoned in the County Jail for a period not exceeding one day for each dollar of fine and costs imposed. For a second violation of this ordinance upon conviction thereof before the Burgess or a Justice of the Peace of said Borough, such person shall be subject to a fine of not less than Five (\$5.00) Dollars, nor more than Ten (\$10.00) Dollars and costs of prosecution, at the discretion of the Burgess or Justice of the Peace, and in default of the payment of such fine and costs shall be imprisoned in the County Jail for a period not exceeding one day for each dollar of fine and costs imposed.

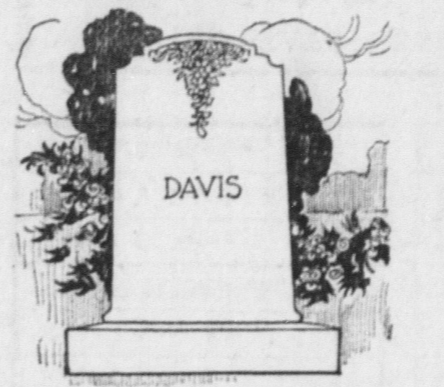

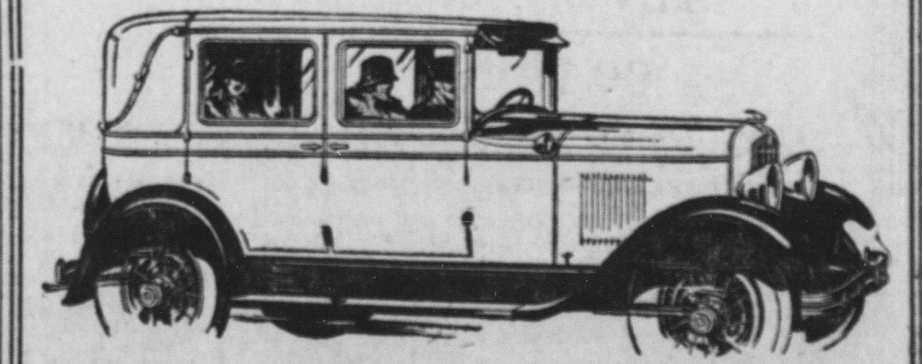
