FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

STATE COLLEGE RADIO—Daily agricultural talks and timely farm and garden hints to be broadcast from the Pennsylvania State College radio station WPSG, beginning Monday, November 12. Each day, except Saturday and Sunday, these farm programs will be started at 12:45 P. M. It is probable that a weather report will be given at the beginning and end of each program. The station will operate on 1230 kilocycles or 242.3 meter wave length.

GUARD AGAINST FIRE—Look out for fire in your woodlot. The trees bore heavy leaf crops this year and the leaves are coming down fast now. When dry they are a constant fire menace.

SHOW ELECTRIC FARM AIDS—One of the exhibits at the recent State poultry show at State College consisted of a series of electric light reflectors for increasing egg laying during the winter. Along with this was a new exhibit showing the minimum recommended farm electric inlet.

REQUIRE COOL STORAGE—A cool temperature (just above freezing) and a somewhat moist atmosphere is needed in storage for cabbage, celery, Chinese cabbage, hohl rabi, and the root crops.

TAKE CARE OF COLT'S FEET—The relation between the direction of the colt's legs and the form of his feet is so close as to make the care of the feet an important means of increasing his usefulness in later years. Horses become unsound of limb when the wear and tear is not equally distributed, certain parts bearing an undue amount.

SAVE SOIL FOR PLANTS—Leaf mold or other rich soil should be placed in a box and stored in the cellar before the ground freezes. This will come in handy for repotting plants during the winter.

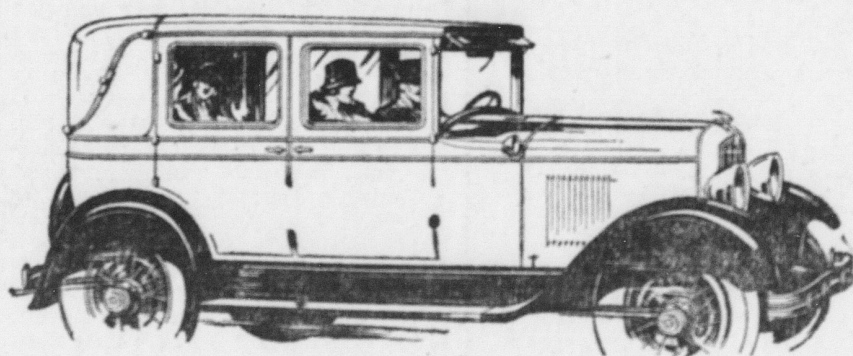
