To Organize Soccer League Among County High Schools.

An attempt to organize a Soccer league among the High schools of Centre county is now under way. Mr. Wm. Jeffrey, Varsity Soccer coach at Penn State, is sponsoring the idea. He has the thought that a very successful league can be organized and is willing to lend his support along this line.

Mr. Jeffrey feels that because of the very small cost of equipment for the game, Soccer should be played by all of the smaller High schools in the county. Not only is Soccer an inexpensive game to play, but is very helpful and interesting as a recreational game.

The County Vocational Supervisor is cooperating with Mr. Jeffrey in his attempt to organize the league and has called a meeting for the very near future at which a representative of each High school in the county has consented to be present.

It is the hope of the County Supervisor that volley ball leagues for both boys and girls might be organized among these schools in addition to the Soccer league so as to give a larger number of pupils more chance to take part in some form of athletics.

FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

PREPARE FOR 1925 GARDEN.—Now is the time to make preparations for the 1925 garden. If this work is not done until early next spring, hurried preparations will result in overlooking many of the details essential to starting the garden under favorable conditions.

SELECT BREEDING TURKEYS.—Before picking the Thanksgiving birds select the breeders for next year. Choose those birds which show good growth and development. The shanks should be heavy and fat and the legs well-set under the birds. A knock-kneed condition reveals lack of vigor. Crooked keel bones are objectionable. They may be caused by poor feeding or they may be the result of breeding. If possible do not keep birds with crooked keel bones for breeding purposes. In the colored varieties, turkey growers prefer birds with good color, but health and vigor are more important than color.

THIN FARM WOODLOT.—Plan to thin an acre of your young timber this winter. State College foresters urge. You will get wood for the winter fires, an appetite for buckwheat cakes and sausage, an improved woodlot, and a lot of satisfaction out of the job.

HOW TO STORE ONIONS.—Remember that onions in storage need a cool temperature, dry atmosphere, and plenty of ventilation.

FEED BROOD SOW RIGHT.—Feed supplied to the sow plays an important role in the success of the 1925 spring pig crop. It is not too early to think of this matter because proper nutrition is just as essential at this time of mating as in any subsequent period. Ask your county agent about the recommended rations.

SAVE TREES FROM MICE.—Are there any signs of mouse injury in your orchards? If so, clean the sod away and replace with cinders. It may be well also to prepare poison bait and place it in bait traps in the orchard. Your county agent can tell you about this, too.
