Some months ago a workman fell from the fifteenth floor of a building in course of construction in New York city. On the thirteenth floor he grabbed a rope hanging from a scaffold and swung himself in on the twelfth floor, saving his life. He afterward confessed that he was as much astonished by his act as anyone who saw him.

The explanation is that the fall of twenty or twenty-five feet before he grabbed the rope occupied about one second and a quarter, which was time enough for his thinking machinery to issue the orders which made his muscles take hold of the rope below at the proper instant. Had he been placed in equal danger while driving a motor car at 60 miles an hour he would have been killed.

Tests with a group of typical motor car drivers have shown that the average time needed to see a danger signal, realize its meaning and begin to press the brake lever is a little more than half a second. In that time, a car traveling 40 miles an hour would move 30 feet. That distance represents the minimum margin of safety the driver must maintain to avoid accident. - Popular Science Monthly.
