## FARM CALENDAR.

#### Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

START FARM ACCOUNTS-With the beginning of the new year, reso lution that will pow well is the decision to keep cost accounts on the ma the practices used will point the way for farm operations. Information on to changes to reduce costs of production and increase profits. Ask your county agent about getting a book and starting the new year right.

BY KNOWN VARIETIES-Buy your apples by the bushel or the barrel and know what variety you are purchasing, State College fruit specialists urge.

GET READY FOR PLANTS-If 9 sash or other plant house is to be built, or the old one needs repairs, the job will be easier now than later. It is also well to get the hotbeds and the coldframes ready for use. An abundant supply of soil for plant growing will be convenient for later use if placed under a good shelter.

STOP CANNIBALISM-Cannibalism in pullets can be partially controlled by darkening nests. "Pick-outs." which is a term used when birds eat at the oviducts, is often started when a bird is on the nest. Some birds acquire the habit of standing at the nest and while the egg is being delivered they will attack the hen on the nest. If the nests are darkened the laying hen is in seclusion and the cannibal hens are

not likely to attack her. SAP FLOW COMING-It is best to plan now for changes to be made in the maple syrup and sugar making equipment. The three months between now and the sap flow will disappear
