Second Bear Killed on Old Nittany. The second bear killed on Nittany Mountain this season was slaughtered by one of a party of McKeesport hunters who are stopping with George L. Horner, at Pleasant Gap. The killing was done on Monday in Greens Valley, east of the Horner improvements on the Greens Valley road, at a point near the west boundary of the State land.

The bear was a female and weighed 200 pounds. The first bear killed ten days earlier was also a female and had with her a cub. She was killed on the Penitentiary lands west of the State road, above Nittany.

The third bear for this season was killed on Nittany Mountain on Tuesday, on the range immediately north of the Dam in Greens Valley, about two miles east of the State House.

VONADA.—Mrs. Edith Vonada died on Tuesday of last week at the home of a daughter, Mrs. William Krader, near Penna Cave, from where interment was made on Saturday in the cemetery formerly connected with the Yearick church, now razed. Services were conducted by Rev. D. R. Keener, pastor of the local Reformed church. The deceased was the widow of Geo. Vonada, who died thirty-three years ago. She was born at Jacksonville, a daughter of Isaac and Mary (Reish) Smith. There survive these children: Mrs. Charles Duck, Millburg; Mrs. Merrill Kessinger, Nittany; Mrs. William Krader, Penna Cave; Leo Vonada, Centre Hall, R. D. 2; and Mrs. D. W. Houser, Cory, Erie county. Mrs. Herbert Hettlinger, Spring Mills and Mrs. Wilbur Lucas, Centre Hall, R. D. 2, are sisters, and Frank Smith, Los Angeles, California, is a brother of the deceased. Mrs. Vonada was aged 67 years and 4 months.

ROYER.—Mrs. Mary Ann Roush Royer, wife of Daniel D. Royer, of Rebersburg, died at her home following a brief illness with paralysis, aged 73 years. Deceased was born at Madisonburg, a daughter of Benjamin and Margaret Roush, both deceased. Surviving, in addition to her husband, to whom she was united in marriage 51 years ago, are two sons, Edwin L. and Klips H. Royer, of Rebersburg; a daughter, Mrs. Anneada Hosterman, of Rebersburg; two sisters, Mrs. Samuel Vonada and Mrs. J. A. Deitrich, of Madisonburg, and a brother, Rev. J. F. Roush, of Reading. Funeral services were held from the Evangelical church at Rebersburg on Thursday afternoon, Rev. I. K. Baker, pastor of the church, officiating. Interment in the cemetery adjoining the church.

HOUTZ.—William A. Houtz died at Grayville after a long illness with complication of diseases. He was born at Houserville and was aged 68 years, 4 months and 15 days. His wife, whose maiden name was Miss Nettie Gates, died eight years ago, and having had no children his survivors include one sister and three brothers: Mrs. Hannah Gummo, Edward and Martin Houtz, of Stormstown, and Oscar, of Sinking Valley.

BRUNGART.—William L. Brungart, who formerly was a resident of this county, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Mary Stoltz, in Muncy, on Monday of last week as the result of a heart attack. Six weeks ago he was stricken, but due to his age he

was unable to rally until the end. Born December 2, 1853, the son of George and Sophia Brungart, he lived on a farm outside of Millburg for many years and was well and favorably known.

Besides his daughter, Mrs. Mary Stoltz, he is survived by a son, George W., of Williamsport, and two brothers, Fred, of Millburg; Adam, of Rebersburg, and three sisters: Mrs. Sophia Laubach, of Brockton; Mrs. Emma Frazier, of Mill Hall; and Mrs. Alice Crouse, of Rebersburg.

Funeral services were held in the Lutheran church, following a short service at the home of Mrs. Stoltz at Muncy. Rev. William Yearick, pastor of the Millburg church, officiated. Burial was made in the Millburg cemetery.

DALE.—Miss Lillian Dale died at the home of John M. Keller, connected with the State Department of Forestry, at Harrisburg, on Saturday, and Tuesday the body was brought to Shiloh cemetery, near Dale Summit, for interment. Services were conducted by Rev. Dr. Reish, of Harrisburg, assisted by Rev. W. J. Wagner, of Boalsburg. The deceased was a daughter of Geo. and Laura (Musser) Dale, both deceased, and was reared at Dale Summit. When the Keller family moved from Boalsburg to Harrisburg, six or more years ago, Miss Dale accompanied them and remained there continuously. She had been ill since last April. Horace Dale, Nebraska; John Dale, State College, and Willard Dale, Bellefonte, are brothers of the deceased.

C. C. ORNDORF, ACCIDENTALLY SHOT, IS AT POINT OF DEATH

Woodward Retired Farmer Is Hit by Stray Bullet Which Passes Through Abdomen—His Call Brings Rescuers.

Charles C. Orndorf, a retired farmer, aged about 60 years, living at Woodward, is in the Centre County Hospital and is in an exceedingly critical condition due to an accidental gun shot wound received on Monday while hunting on the mountain back of the home of Ranger Motz. The bullet entered the back close to the spine, passing through the body a little below the stomach.

Mr. Orndorf, according to a statement attributed to him, said he had been talking to an unknown hunter, and a moment after they separated the bullet hit him. He called to the man, saying, "You shot me!" "No," said the hunter, "I did not shoot; it was the other fellow." The hunter then disappeared without rendering aid. Mr. Orndorf's call for help attracted

the attention of two young men from Woodward who went to the rescue. The wounded man was carried to his home, in Woodward, and shortly thereafter was given first aid by Dr. Morrow and then taken to the hospital in the ambulance. His condition noted in the first paragraph of this article was reported from the hospital Wednesday morning. Game Warden Mosler, of Bellefonte, and John E. Ross, a division supervisor of the game commission, of Lock Haven, were on the scene and state a thorough investigation is being made.

YOUTH OF 20 INSTANTLY KILLED.

Walter Dolan, While Riding Bicycle on State Road Was Struck by Cars Passing in Opposite Direction.

Walter Dolan, aged almost twenty years on Sunday evening was hit by a car while riding a bicycle on the State road at Peck's store, Nittany, near his home to where he was going. The youth's skull was crushed, causing instant death. He was about to enter a lane when two cars coming in opposite directions were about to pass. One of the car drivers threw on his brakes, causing his car to swerve, hit the other car and caused it to strike the young man.

The youth was a son of Mr. and Mrs. George Dolan. Six brothers and one sister survive him.

Stray Bullet Hits Horse Hitched to Buggy.

Roland Fye, of near Colyer had a thrilling experience on Saturday. He was driving a horse hitched to a buggy from his home to the store at Colyer when a stray bullet from some unknown hunter's gun hit the horse on the hip, causing the animal to fall in his tracks. Mr. Fye and two little girls—Mary and Freda—daughters of Fred Brown, who were with him in the buggy, were thoroughly frightened. The hunter who fired the shot either did not see the horse the bullet worked, or, if he did see it fled without giving aid. Mr. Fye claims he saw a hunter with a rifle at some distance, but could not describe him.

Vincent Johnston, a member of the Ikesburg hunting party located at the Hocks, Seven Mountains on Saturday, was slightly wounded over the stomach. He was taken to the Lewis-town hospital where it was discovered that the wound had evidently been made by a spawl from a bullet which struck a rock. A small portion of a bullet was removed from under the skin. The wound was dressed after which Mr. Johnston rejoined his companions and resumed hunting.
