**SHOWS VALUABLE TO FARMER**—Competitive spirit is given a chance for expression in farm products shows. The educational feature however, is the chief value of such exhibitions. The display shows the exhibitor how his products compare with the exhibits beside them. If the other fellow's are better it will stimulate the lower prize winner to do a little better the next year. Thus a valuable lesson is learned.

**PRUNING IMPORTANT TO TREES**—There are two purposes for which the pruning shears and saw are used in the orchard; the first, both in time and importance, is to train the tree to the desired type of framework; the second, to maintain that framework in condition to produce the maximum amount of good quality fruit.

**GOOD CARE NECESSARY**—Good feed and plenty of exercise this winter will add the ewes to produce good lambs next spring.

**RECORDS TELL STORY**—A good farm record book accurately kept will help a farmer to know his business. A farm with records is like a clock without hands. It may be running right but there is no way of knowing it.

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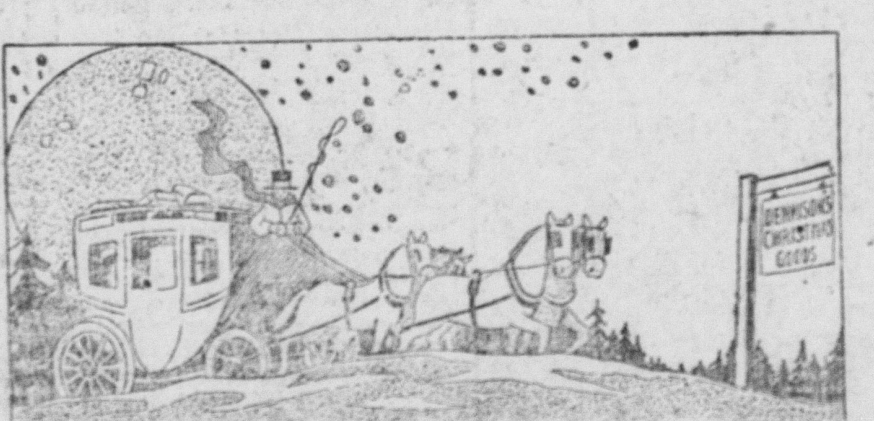
