**STATE GRANGE CONVENTION TO ATTRACT MANY**

**Between Thirteen and Fifteen Hundred Delegates Expected to Attend Sessions, Which Opened Tuesday.**

Between thirteen and fifteen hundred delegates are expected to attend the fifty-sixth annual meeting of the Pennsylvania State Grange in Williamsport for three days this week.

The convention sessions are being held in the Elks' auditorium.

The first session opened in the sixth degree at 10:30 o'clock Tuesday morning and was followed by an address of welcome by Mayor H. T. Ames.

In anticipation of a record-setting attendance, the housing committee appealed to private homes for accommodation of some of the delegates. One hundred and forty homes have been opened. These are providing rooms for 550 delegates. In addition, John F. Letton, directing manager of the Williamsport Hotels company, will have the Park hotel open for the entire week, although no meals will be served there.

The program for the convention has been made exceedingly attractive because of the prominence of the speakers who have been secured. It is probable too, that inspection tours of local industries may be planned for periods when the association is not in session.

**MONTHLY REPORT OF COW TESTING ASSOCIATION**

The Centre County Cow Testing Association No. 1 makes the following report for November as submitted by the cow tester Ira Whiteman. There were 27 herds tested, including 325 cows in milk; 77 cows were dry. During the month there were 17 cows sold that were profitable and one unprofitable cow. Out of this group there were 44 cows produced over 40 pounds of butterfat and 14 cows over 50 pounds of butterfat. The following are the 10 highest in butterfat production, giving the name of the owner and the record.

(Note: Following name of owner and address, comes breed of cow, lbs. milk, per cent fat, and lbs. butterfat.)

**Hammers Resound as 70-Year Peace of "Old Main" Ends.**

Penn State's "Old Main," its age-hallowed interior desolate of classes for the first time in its seventy years of existence, is resounding with the knocking and hammering of workmen who are tearing out its obsolete vitals condemned for use ten years ago.

For thirty years "Old Main" was the solitary academic unit of Penn State, during which time it also served as a dormitory for the famous Old Main Rats, says the Penn State Collegian. None of the subsequent buildings erected on the campus have ever attained the popularity or majesty of the original edifice which is acclaimed an outstanding landmark in the Nittany Valley.

Officials state that \$500,000 is available for the rebuilding of the warped and twisted interior. The building will be reinforced and re-constructed as much as possible in its present form.
