DEATHS

FLORAY.—William Franklin Floray passed out of this life on Tuesday morning after an illness which apparently had its origin five years ago at which time while employed by the State Highway Department, he fell from a truck onto his head. It was at first thought his injury was slight, but it was several weeks before he was able to resume work, and since then was frequently annoyed with a soreness of the muscles of the neck. During October the muscles began to enlarge and finally became hardened. As time passed on this condition became more aggravated and for some time previous to his death the throat appeared to be paralyzed, making it impossible to take food except in liquid form and during his latter days he was unable to swallow water. Fortunately, however, the affliction brought with it little pain.

The deceased was a son of George and Rebecca (Fultz) Floray. He lived in Centre Hall almost, if not altogether, all of his life. For a number of years up to the time of the beginning of his last illness, he was employed by the State Highway Department, and was advanced to a caretaker, having the road between here and Bellefonte under his supervision. Last year he received notice from the department that his position was the best cared for in the district.

He is survived by a wife, whose maiden name was Lavina Breen, but no children. Mrs. Mary Snyder, of Muncy, is a sister, the only survivor of the three Floray children. He attained the sixty-ninth year of his age on August 5th, last.

Interment will be made in the cemetery here this (Thursday) afternoon. Rev. S. F. Greenhoe to officiate.

LYTLE.—Mrs. Margaret Lytle, one of the best known and highly esteemed ladies in Ferguson township, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. D. S. Peterson, at Baileyville, after a long illness of complications. She was a daughter of Abram and Jane Boyer Biddle, pioneer settlers of Wadlie, where she was born May 19, 1859. January 6, 1882, she was united in marriage to Ellis Lytle, farmer and surveyor, who preceded her to the grave some twenty years ago. She is survived by her daughter, Mrs. Peterson, one brother, Wm. Biddle, and two sisters, Mrs. John Eaves and Mrs. I. G. Burkett, of Half Moon Valley. Mrs. Lytle was a good christian woman, being a member of the Presbyterian church practically from childhood, and was an active worker in all its branches. Interment was made in Gray's cemetery by the side of her husband. The funeral was very largely attended.

TIBBINS.—Dr. Joseph Edward Tibbins, one of the oldest if not the oldest physician in this part of the State, died at his home in Beech Creek, Clinton county, on Friday morning. His death followed a lingering illness of a complication of diseases incident to age. Dr. Tibbins was born November 15, 1847, in Nittany Valley near Jacksonville, Centre county, the son of Samuel and Elizabeth Tibbins. During his early boyhood he attended the common schools and later a seminary and normal school in Centre county. Deceased then began reading medicine and taught school for five terms during which time he read medicine with Dr. Joseph Holloway and Dr. Dorworth, both pioneer physicians. Dr. Tibbins graduated from the Jefferson Medical college in Philadelphia in 1875. He was a Civil War veteran, having enlisted in Company I, Pennsylvania Volunteers, and served three and one-half months, after which he returned to his home in Nittany Valley.

Dr. Tibbins resided in Beech Creek since 1875 and practiced medicine until several months ago.

He is survived by a widow and two sons; also by these brothers and sisters: Samuel I. Tibbins, Mrs. Angelina Noll, of Peabody, Kansas; Henry P. Tibbins, of Bellefonte; Mrs. Alice Showers, of Bellefonte; and Mrs. Elizabeth Tate, of Pleasant Gap.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon, with interment in the Hayes-Fearon cemetery at Beech Creek.

VANORMER.—Mrs. Elizabeth Van Ormer, a daughter of the late George and Molly (Keon) Swartz died at her home in Coatesville after a prolonged illness, aged 69 years and 10 months.

Mrs. Van Ormer was one of four children in the George Swartz family who were residents of Millheim more than fifty years ago, the father having conducted a store on the site now occupied by the Farmers National Bank & Trust Co.

Deceased's husband, Reess Van Ormer, died about ten years ago. Surviving are one sister, Mrs. Annie Caswell, of Coatesville, and two brothers, Ed Swartz, of Punksutawney, and Rev. Dr. M. E. Swartz, of Sunbury.

Funeral services were held from the home and interment was made immediately following in the Coatesville cemetery.

5500 Does Killed in Centre County.

Game Protector Mosier estimates from reports received up to Tuesday evening that a total of 3700 deer—does and bucks—were killed in Centre county. The estimate places the does killed at 3500, and that but between 150 to 200 illegal deer were slaughtered Saturday the season for doe ends.

FIVE CAMPS KILL 72 DOES.

Five camps in the Seven Mountains killed a total of seventy-two does prior to Saturday of last week, on which day or before all camps broke up. The camps having these kills were Ickesburg, 19; Shamokin, 16; Thompsonstown, 14; Slacks, 13; Bradfords, 12.

Dental Clinic at Centre Hall.

The clinic was to have been conducted by the State Oral Hygienist, but due to some misunderstanding, it is impossible for her to be here this school term, so Dr. White has offered to conduct it himself.
