JAMISON.—Elery Jamison, after a prolonged illness, died on New Year's day at the home of his sister, Mrs. V. A. Auman, in Centre Hall, to where he came from Butte, Montana, four weeks ago. Funeral services will be held at the house Friday afternoon, and interment made in the Cross church cemetery, Georges Valley, Rev. S. F. Greenhoe to officiate. The deceased was a son of Jacob and Harriet (Seiler) Jamison. He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Lila Bluff, Seattle, Washington, and these sisters and brother: Mrs. Wm. Lingle, Georges Valley; Mrs. Robert McCummon, Altoona; Mrs. W. H. Lingle, Tusseyville; Orie A., Altoona, and Mrs. V. A. Auman, Centre Hall. He was aged 69 years, 7 months and 27 days.

POSTER.—William L. Poster, a prominent State College business man, died on Monday from an affection of the heart. He was reared at Oak Hall Station, but was a resident of State College since attaining manhood. At the organization of the First National Bank he was made president, holding the office until about a year ago. He was engaged as a general merchant for many years and had various other business interests in the college town. He is survived by a wife and two children.

Interment was made at Bellefonte.

CARVER.—Mrs. Carrie Carver passed away at the age of almost eighty-six years at the home of a daughter, in Los Angeles, California. Mrs. Carver was reared on the Goodhart (Kerr) farm, near Centre Hill, and was a daughter of Michael and Rebecca (Stamm) Pauley. She was twice married. Her first husband was George Washington Kerlin, an uncle of A. E. Kerlin, of town, and the second, Reuben Carver, a native of Nebraska. With the first husband she had five children and to the second, one. A brother, John Pauley, of Rockford, Ill. is the last of the Pauley family. Mrs. M. F. Rossmann, Mrs. Wm. Bltner, of Tusseyville, and Wm. A. Wagner, of Juniata, and Samuel Wagner, of Boalsburg, are nieces and nephews, respectively, of the deceased.

Burchfield, of Altoona; Mrs. Effie Jacobs, of Boalsburg, and Edward Burchfield, of Juniata. Burial was made in the Roselawn cemetery, Altoona.

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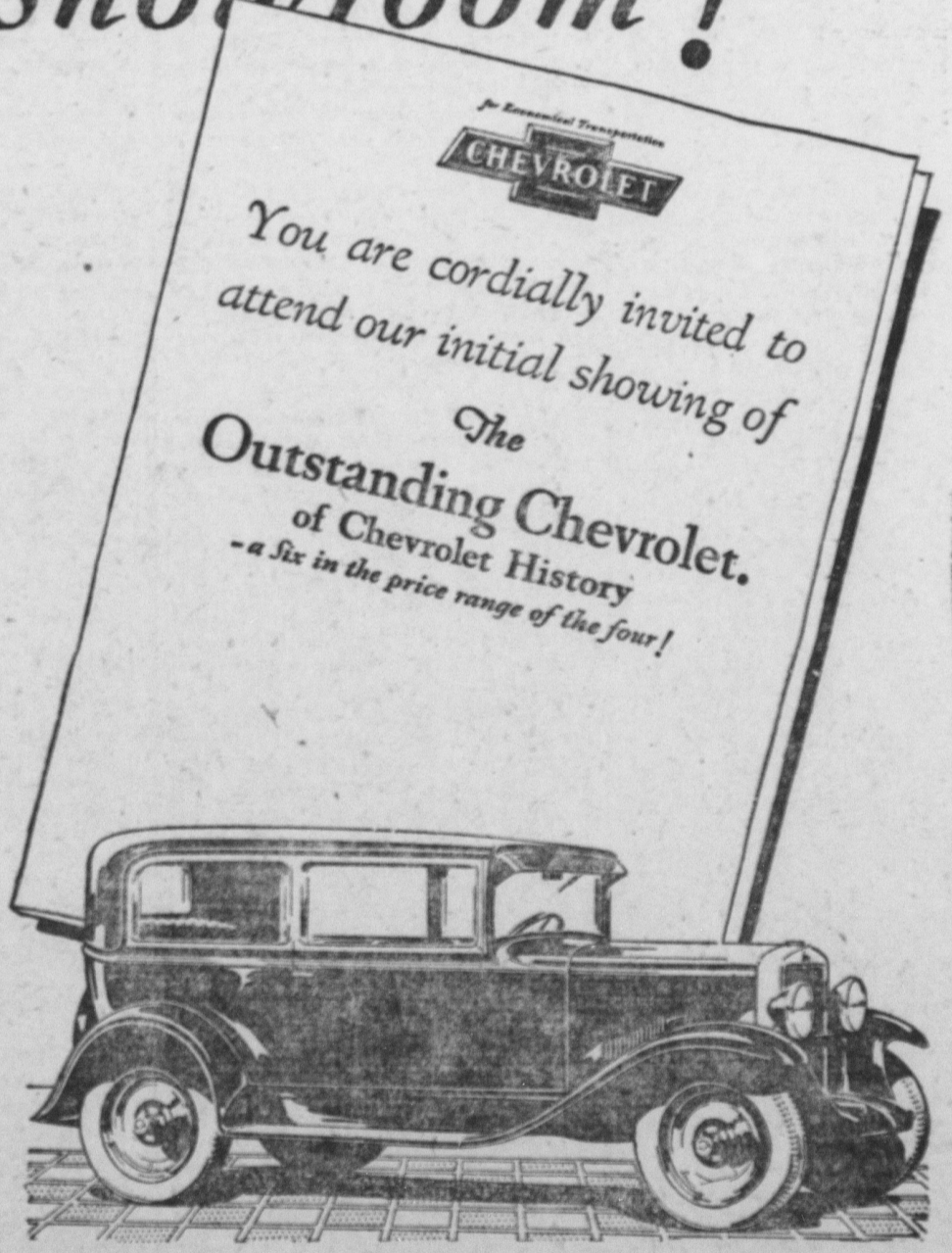
