**BETTER RURAL TELEPHONE SERVICE AFTER FEBY 1.**

Farmers and other residents of rural areas in Pennsylvania will be enabled to obtain telephone service on and after February 1st under more liberal arrangements than ever before. It is announced by J. H. Caum, manager for the Bell Telephone Company of Penna.

On that date multi-party line mileage charges will be eliminated throughout the State, certain construction charges now required by the company for the erection of pole lines to provide service where poles do not exist will be greatly curtailed, and a minimum of only four applicants for service instead of six, will be required by the company before establishing service for groups of rural residents who desire it. The company also plans to abandon all construction charges to subscribers in cases where only wires and cross-arms will be involved in providing service.

The prospective elimination of multi-party line mileage charges will benefit about 15,000 of the company's rural subscribers, while the other impending reductions are expected to result in a pronounced extension of telephone service in farm territory and rural regions generally, Mr. Caum said.

Mr. Caum also announced today that further reductions in long distance telephone rates to points between 120 and approximately 1500 miles distant are to become effective February 1.

To the telephone user the new schedule will mean a cut of from 5 to 25 centon day toll and long distance station-to-station calls for air-line distances of from 130 to approximately 1500 miles.

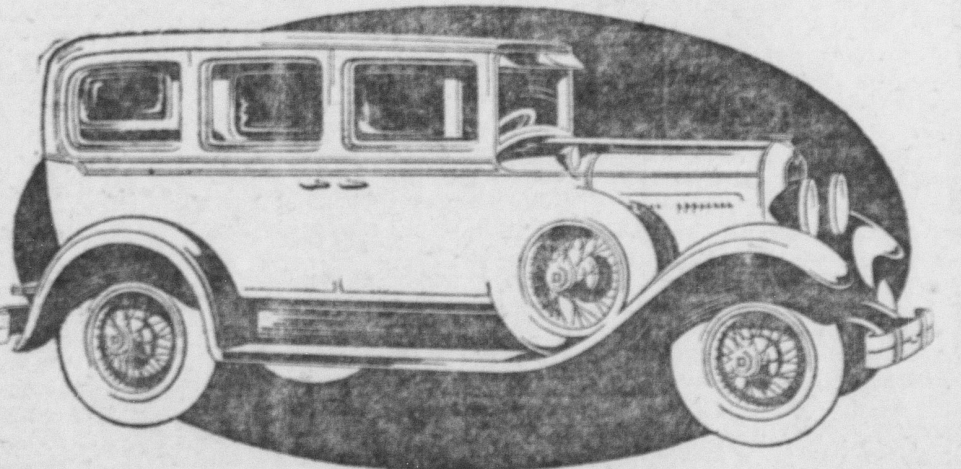
