FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

PROVIDE WATER FOR HOGS—Shall water provided for hogs be heated? Answering this question livestock specialists at State College say that experiment station results from several States indicate that there is enough increase gained to make the practice of heating water or cooking slops profitable. Water should, however, be available at all times as it is an essential part of the swine ration.

PLAN HOME GARDEN—A home garden that is planted on the spur of the moment after warm weather appears in the spring is only half a garden. Now is the time to plan your garden. Divide your available space between the different vegetables desired. Plan according to your family needs and tastes. Draw your plan on paper to scale if necessary. Then work out your seed order.

ORDER FOREST TREES—Although spring is the time to plant trees on waterland, not now growing trees, right now is the time to apply for the trees from the State. Application blanks and assistance may be obtained from your county agent. The supply of the best kinds are rapidly being exhausted by those who have already sent in their orders.

MAKE CALVES COMFORTABLE—Dairy calves should have warm, dry, well-bedded stalls, and they will grow more satisfactorily if each calf has a stall by itself. If this is not possible then each calf should be tied with a rope or fastened in stanchion during feeding. Be sure they do not suffer from thirst which often occurs even when they have milk to drink.
