RED MILL BURNED.

Potter Township Landmark Wiped Out of Existence Wednesday Forenoon

Kilmer Owner of Mill.

—Nearby Property Saved—A. M.

The Red Mill, a flour and chop mill erected early in the history of Potter township, was totally consumed by fire Wednesday forenoon. The fire, it appears, was carried by a spark from the stove, or from the flue on the inside. The fire was not discovered until the flame had already made great headway. The neighbors who gathered noting the structure doomed, gave their attention to saving nearby buildings. These are the Kilmer home, a part of the mill property, and the J. W. Dashem farm buildings.

A call to Bellefonte for the services of the pumper was recalled. The wooden structure was so quickly consumed that danger of spreading the flames had passed before the company could prepare for making the twelve-mile trip.

A. M. Kilmer is the owner of the mill. He carried insurance, but is not known how much.

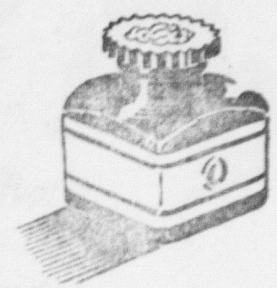
