**BENNER**—John W. Benner, aged 62, died Friday morning at 5:45 o'clock at his home in Bellefonte, of diabetes. His wife survives with the following children: Mrs. Margaret Conboy, Ernest Benner, and Harold Benner, all of Bellefonte; Donald, Eleanor, Philip, Louise and Frederick, all at home. He also leaves the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. Hezekiah Hoy, of Le-mont; Mrs. Harvey Tressler, of Belle-fonte; Mrs. Gray Hastings, of Avis, and Clarence Benner, of Bellefonte. Mr. Benner, about nine years ago, moved from the Cape Royal farm, west of Old Fort, where he had lived as a tenant, to Bellefonte. Since living in Bellefonte he served as janitor of the court house under a Democratic board of commissioners.

Funeral services were held at the home Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. Campbell, pastor of the Evangelical church, officiated; burial in the Union cemetery.

**BUTTORFF**—Mrs. Tamer C. Buttorff, widow of Charles A. Buttorff, died at her home, 225 North Main street, Yeager-town, Thursday afternoon, 1:30 o'clock, aged 92 years, 2 months and 23 days. The cause of her death was heart trouble.

The deceased leaves three sons and one daughter: John and Elmer Buttorff, Elmont, and Arnie Buttorff, of Burnham, and Mrs. Thomas (Annie) Bight, at her parental home.

Her sister, Mrs. Catherine Ostermeyer, of Amersburg, is a half-sister of the deceased.

Mrs. Buttorff was a member of the Methodist church, Yeagerstown. The funeral services were conducted at the late residence in Yeagerstown, Sunday afternoon, 2:30 o'clock, by the pastor of the deceased, Rev. Henry Kessel. Burial in the Lutheran cemetery, Yeager-town.

**SHANK**—William Landis Shank, of Treaster Valley, near Sigerville, died suddenly of a heart attack Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the home of his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Treaster, Locks Bank, Mifflin county. He was born June 7, 1861, the son of David and Matilda (Bots) Shank, of Sigerville, being 68 years, 2 months and 22 days at the time of his death.

After attending the services at the Sigerville Lutheran church Sunday morning, Mr. and Mrs. Shank went to the Treaster home, where they enjoyed their dinner. During the afternoon Mr. Shank and Mr. Treaster were looking over the stock in the Treaster barn, when Mr. Shank was suddenly seized with the heart attack. He fell unconscious to the ground, fracturing his nose. Dr. Howard Smiley was summoned, but he had died immediately.

He is survived by his wife, whose maiden name was Mary Fultz, to whom

he was married in Milroy 44 years ago, and the following children survive: Mrs. Edward (Margaret) Treaster, of Locks Bank; Mrs. Albert (Tillie) Henry, Milroy; Mrs. Brown (Bianche) Hackett, Spring Mills; Arthur P., Milroy; E. Brown Shank, Milroy; Mrs. Robert (Edna) Wagner, Milroy; Vernon L., at home; Mrs. Samuel (Bessie) Krepps, Sigerville, and Mrs. Harry Hassinger, Sigerville.

A brother, Benjamin F. Shank, and a half-brother, Samuel Shank, both of Milroy, and two sisters, Mrs. Burns (Arlie) Alexander, Sigerville, and Mrs. Martha Hill Inverness, Amersburg. Thirty-eight grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren also survive the deceased.

Mr. Shank was a farmer all his life, and was very well known and respected. He was a member of the Sigerville Lutheran church.

**KAUP**—Mrs. Joanna Kaup, widow of George Kaup, died in Boonsburg on Tuesday morning after an illness dating back to December 19th of last year. Death was due to heart trouble and complications. Interment will be made in the Boonsburg cemetery on Friday at 2:00 P. M.

Mrs. Kaup was a daughter of Samuel and Catharine (Dinges) Stover, and was born at Rock Springs, April 24th, 1848, making her age at the time of her death eight days less than eighty-six years. Her marriage to Mr. Kaup took place March 25, 1895. There were born to this union five children, all living except the eldest, Frank. They are: Samuel, of Juniata; Esther, wife of James Fry, Philadelphia; Miss Hattie, at home, and Eva, wife of John Fisher, Bellefonte. One sister, Mrs. James Garrock, of Bellefonte, survives her, as do also ten grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

**HOLTER**—Mrs. Edith Weber Holter, aged 88 years, wife of Philip C. Holter, died Friday evening at 7:40 at her home in Howard of a hemorrhage.

Mrs. Holter was a member of the Methodist church at Howard, and a member of the Bellefonte order of Eastern Star and Corinth Shrine No. 23.

Surviving besides her husband are her mother, Mrs. Abraham Weber; one brother, Elmer Weber; two sisters, Mrs. Mary Long and Mrs. Emma Cneeman, the latter of Williamsport.

Funeral services were held from the home Monday afternoon, the Rev. J. P. Smith officiating. Burial was made in the Schenck cemetery, Howard.

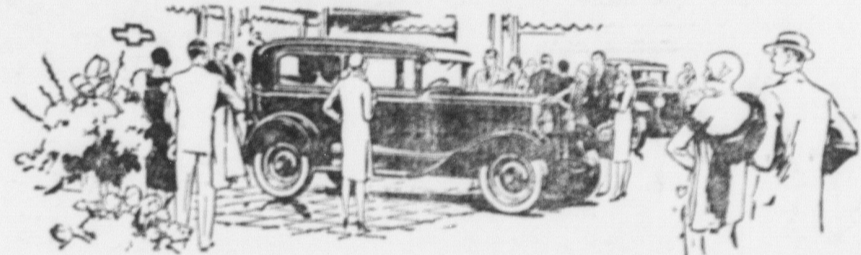

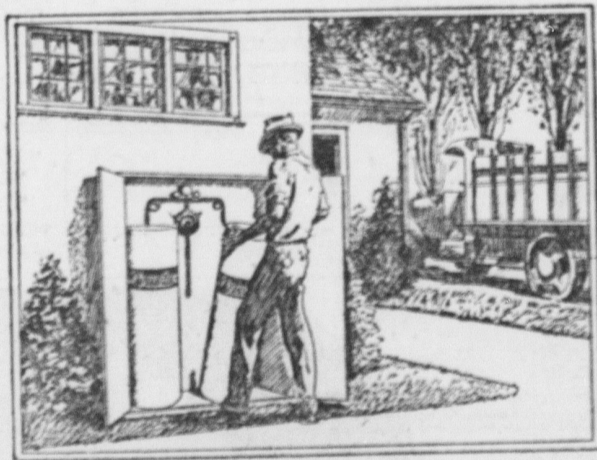
