DEATHS

POTTER.—Joshua Taylor Potter
died Tuesday noon at his home in Cen-
tre Hall after an illness due to compli-
cations incident to age. He was born
August 4th, 1849, and was a son of
Jos. u Potter and Mary Ann Taylor
Potter. He married Martha R. Mc-
Cormick on October 31, 1878, the Rev.
L. L. Haughwatt officiating. On Sep-
tember 9, 1914, Mrs. Potter was called
to her reward, aged 62 years, 5 months
and 14 days. To this union were born
three children: Robert F. Potter, who
died in infancy; Mary Delinda Potter
and W. H. Potter, of Centre Hall.
Mr. Potter was the youngest of eight
children, all deceased. He was educa-
ted at Boalsburg Academy. He was a
charter member of Progress Grange
and always interested in its success and
that of the farmer, having been en-
gaged in agriculture all of his active
life.
He was elected elder of the Sinking
Creek Presbyterian church, September
20th, 1886, and was faithful to his du-
ties up until the time of his last illness.
The community loses one of its best
citizens, and the church loses one of
its fathers, in the passing of Mr.
Potter.
Funeral services will be held Friday
afternoon at 2:00 o'clock and burial in
the cemetery here. Rev. J. M. Kirk-
patrick, pastor of the Presbyterian
church, will be the officiating minister.

months.

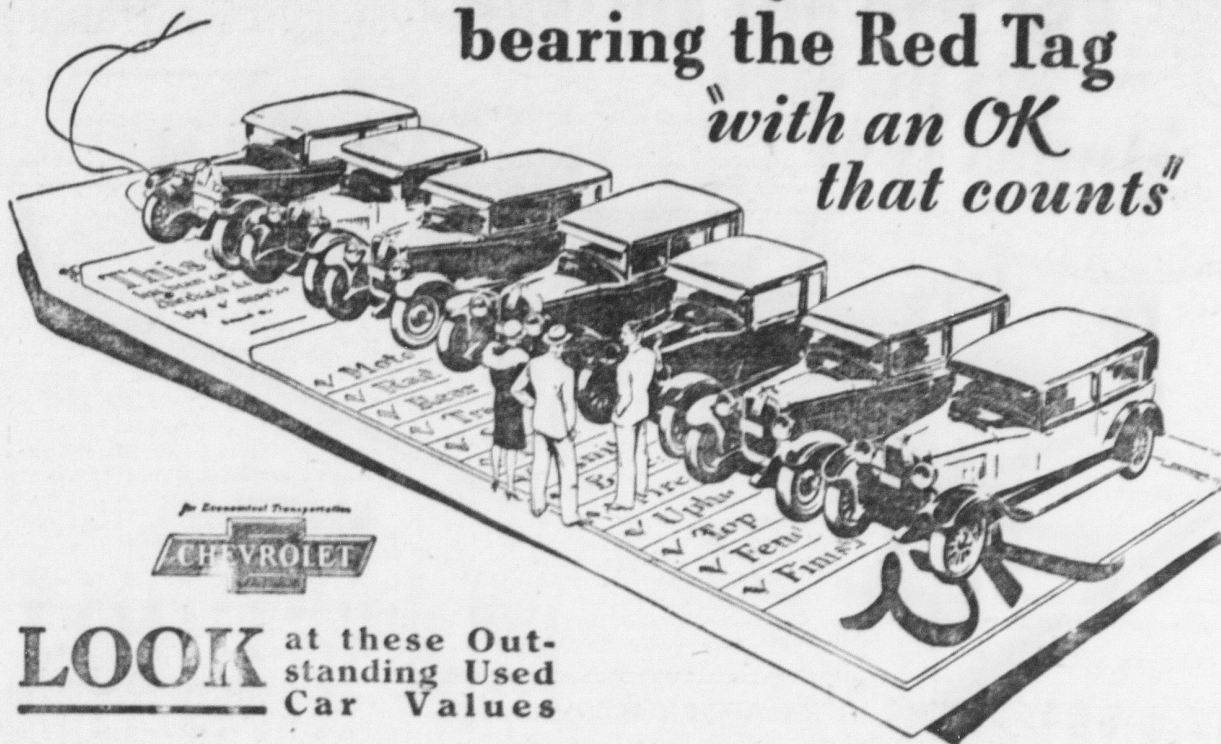
Burnham Auctioneer Falls Dead.
