DEATHS

SWABB—Mrs. Margaret Swabb died late Sunday night at the Centre County hospital from peritonitis, at the age of 83 years, 10 months and 3 days. She had been at the hospital for a week or ten days, having been taken there from State College where she lived with the George Koons family. Mrs. Swabb was the widow of Henry Swabb, who died about fifteen years ago in Centre Hall. There were no children. Her parents were Benjamin and Eva (Moser) Wion, and she was born and reared in Mifflin county. She was the last survivor of the family.

Burial was made in the cemetery here on Wednesday from the funeral parlors of the Goodhart undertaking establishment, followed by services in the Lutheran church, Rev. S. F. Greenhoe officiating.

HAINES—Simon Elias Haines was born at Woodward, July 20, 1867, and died in his home at Woodward, May 3rd, aged 59 years, 11 months and 10 days. Eleven years ago he was married to Mrs. Martha Moore.

He was a faithful member of the Woodward Evangelical church, also a member of the Woodward Camp No. 357, P. O. S. of A.

He is survived by his widow, four brothers and two sisters. The funeral services were conducted by the family pastor, Rev. H. C. Kleffel, from his late home on Tuesday at 9:30 A. M. with services in the church and burial in the Woodward cemetery.

MILLER—The last Sunday in April Thomas Miller, former well known merchant and miller of Tyrone, passed away into the life beyond. Mr. Miller, who had been residing for some time in Sinking Valley, fell last November and injured his limb. The wound was obstinate and would not heal. Four weeks ago gangrene set in and Mr. Miller was taken to the Altoona hospital for treatment. In an effort to save his life an operation was resorted to on Saturday but it was of no avail.

Thomas Miller was a son of Wm. and Leah Summy Miller. He was born at Potters Bank, later Potters Mills, on April 19, 1848. He never married. A number of years ago he was a merchant in Tyrone, conducting a general merchandising business under the firm name of Miller and Bottorff. He was a miller by occupation and for a number of years conducted a flour mill. One sister, Mrs. D. C. Mitchell, of Alexandria, survives his death. She is the last member of the family of Wm. and Leah Summy Miller. Funeral services were held Tuesday, conducted by Rev. Walter K. Harnish, pastor of the Sinking Valley Presbyterian church. Interment at Arch Springs.

ROBB—Jacob S. Robb, a well known retired farmer of Howard, expired suddenly at his home from a heart attack. He was born at Romola and was a son of Peter and Anna Mary Robb. His first wife, who was Mary Martha Bowes, preceded him to the grave a number of years ago. On June 28, 1928, he was married to Mrs. Davis Frain, who survives. These children to the former wife also survive: Rev. A. H. Robb, of Export; Mrs. Austin Runkle, of York; Rev. Charles Robb, of Toms Brook, Va.; Mrs. Jasper Aaron, of Beech Creek; Prof. Albert Robb, of Mechanicsburg; and Thomas Robb, of Prohatsburg. His one brother, Prof. George Robb, principal of the Altoona public schools, also survives. Mr. Robb farmed at Romola until a few years ago and was a charter member of the First Reformed church of Howard. Funeral services were held on Wednesday of last week at the Reformed church, in charge of Rev. O. T. Moyer; interment at Howard.

HAUGH—Thursday evening, April 25th, John Haugh, a well known business man of State College, went out for a short walk as was his habit before retiring. He failed to return about the usual time, so his wife and family became anxious about him. A search was started which was continued all through the night. The search was terminated next morning about 8:30 when his dead body was discovered on the lawn of Dr. Ray Gilliland who lives less than a block from Mr. Haugh's home. Mr. Haugh had not been in good health for some time. His death was caused by a heart attack.

Mr. Haugh was a son of Thomas and Margaret Haugh and was born in Muirkirk Ayrshire, Scotland, June 27, 1858; at the time of his death he was 70 years, 10 months of age. He was married to Rosa Rowland in 1882. The deceased is survived by his wife and three children: Thomas G. and C. H. Hubert, of State College, and Mrs. J. M. Kirkpatrick, wife of the Presbyterian minister of Centre Hall. He is also survived by a step-mother six brothers and one sister, who are residents of Scotland.

He was a member of St. Paul's M. E. church of State College, and of the Men's Bible class of that church taught by Prof. Harris.

The funeral services were held from Mr. Haugh's late home on Monday at 2:00 P. M., April 29, conducted by Rev. Witman, assisted by Rev. Becker, ministers of St. Paul's church. The male quartette composed of Hamil Holmes, Howard Musser, Newton Hartswick, and David Sigel sang two beautiful selections. Interment was made in Pine Hill cemetery, near State College.

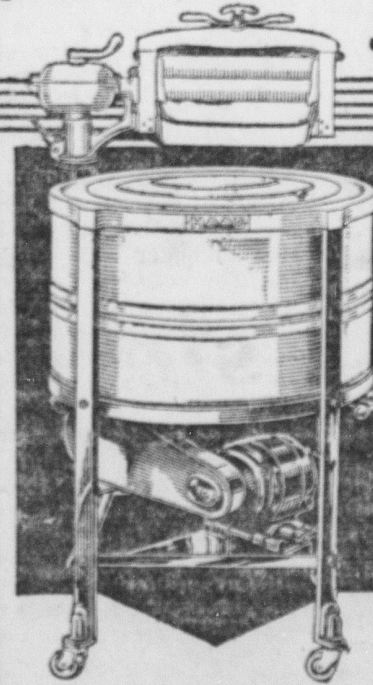
