DEATHS

POWELL.—Rayston W. Powell, af-
ter having been a patient in the Johns-
Hopkins hospital, Baltimore, died at
that institution on Wednesday after-
noon. The body was shipped through
error to Lewistown and from there
brought to Centre Hall where it was
taken in charge by funeral director F.
V. Goodhart. Funeral services were
held on Saturday morning from the
home of Mrs. Powell's sister, Mrs. Mil-
ford Luse, and burial made here.
Mr. Powell was a native of Georgia,
having been born at Rome, that State.
He attained his fiftieth year on March
10th, last. He was engaged as a sales-
man of lighting plants and electrical
appliances. Mr. Powell and his wife,
who before marriage was Miss Jennie
Kerstetter, and only daughter, Miss
Gerardine, lived at Harrisburg, but lat-
ter located in York where they now live.
Besides the widow and daughter named
the deceased has two sisters living in
Rome.

Mr. Powell had been in delicate health
for some time, and shortly after a
visit here at Easter time, went to the
noted Baltimore hospital for treatment.
Death was due to carcinoma of the
stomach.

SHEATS.—Charles W. Sheats, aged
62 years, of Lock Haven, died at the
Lock Haven hospital ten minutes after
he had been admitted, suffering from
injuries received when he was struck
by a freight of the Pennsylvania Rail-
road at the bridge crossing the Bald
Eagle creek about a mile east of that
city. His injuries included fractures of
the skull, crushed ribs, compound
fracture of the left leg and possible in-
ternal injuries.

He had gone out after dinner, and
had spoken of attending the funeral of
Harry Myers at Casatena. It is thought
he changed his mind and decided in-
stead to take a walk. He was deaf,
and evidently failed to hear the train.
He is survived by his wife, three
sons and three daughters: Mrs. Beattie
James, Mrs. Arthur Smart, Guy and
Ernest, all of Lock Haven; Russell, of
Brooklyn, N. Y., and Mrs. Don Ritchie,
of Dunnstown. He also leaves one
brother, William Sheats, of Williams-
port, and one sister, Mrs. Clayton
Vonnada, of Woodward.

He had lived in Lock Haven for
about thirty years, and conducted a
small grocery store, and for years he
had followed the trade of carpenter.

FLEMING.—Mrs. Belle Ward Flem-
ing, wife of Wilson I. Fleming, and
mother of President Judge M. Ward
Fleming, died at her home Friday
morning at 10:45 following a linger-
ing illness with complications. She
was aged 69 years. Beside her hus-
band and son she is survived by three

all of Bellefonte. Funeral services were
held at the home Monday afternoon
at 2 o'clock. Rev. Homer C. Knox,
