School Supt. Salary Increase.

A bill increasing the minimum salary of school superintendents and their assistants in counties of the fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth classes, was signed by Governor Fisher. The increase is \$500 from the present pay for these officials.

The increase applies to Centre county, Centre being an eighth-class county.



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

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
