DEATHS

KEPLER.—Aaron Charles ("Chap-
pin") Kepler, aged 39 years, died at
2:30 o'clock Thursday morning at the
Altoona hospital, to where he was taken
on a week previous, following an op-
eration for appendicitis.

Surviving are his wife, Millicent;
three children, Aaron, Millicent and
Stella Ann; his mother, Mrs. Charlotte
Kepler; a half-brother, Hon. William
Kepler, of Pine Grove Mills; two sis-
ters, Mrs. Devoe Mead, of Washing-
ton, D. C., and Mrs. Edward Grapp, of
Pittsburgh.

Funeral services were held at two
o'clock Saturday afternoon from his
home, about two miles west of Pine
Grove Mills.

Mr. Kepler became a well known
figure among agriculturists in Centre
county as a potato grower, his acre-
age and yield having been among the
largest in this section. He also grew
strawberries and other small fruit on
a large scale.

SMITH.—Edwin Krape Smith died in
Chicago on Thursday of last week,
after an operation he underwent the
Monday previous. The body was ship-
ped to Bellefonte and from there con-
veyed on Monday afternoon to Aar-
onsburg by Funeral Director F. V.
Goodhart, where interment was made
in the family plot.

The deceased was a son of Samuel C.
and Susan (Krape) Smith, and was
reared on the farm east of town, now
owned by W. H. Homan. He engaged
in teaching school when a young man
and on leaving the county he lived in
various middle western States, finally
locating in Chicago, where at the time
of his death he was employed in a
milk distributing plant.

He is survived by a widow, who be-
fore marriage was Miss Sadie Tate, and
son, Andrew, a school teacher living in
New York State.

He was aged about 50 years.

MILLER.—Roy Monroe Miller died on
Saturday, at the age of 64 years and
19 days. Funeral services were held
from his home on Tuesday, and inter-
ment made at Tusseyville cemetery.
Services were conducted by Rev. De-
las Keener of the Reformed church.

Mr. Miller located near Colyer forty-
two years ago, having come to the
valley from Clearfield county. He was
a lumberman by occupation and spent
nineteen years in the lumber regions of
Virginia. A few years ago he was in-
jured in an automobile accident, from
the effects of which he never fully re-
covered.

He is survived by a widow, who be-
fore marriage was Miss Ellen Wingard,
a daughter of the late Samuel Wingard
of Potter township. Also, by three
children, all at home, namely, Elmer
M., Mrs. Bertha Miller Haskell, and
Krydie P.; also by two grandchildren,
Dr. John W. Miller, of Kansas City,
Missouri; Dr. Sommerfield Miller, of

Madera, Clearfield county, and Dr. J.
A. Miller, of Grantland, Clearfield coun-
ty, are brothers, and Mrs. John Carper,
of Linden Hall, is a sister of the de-
ceased.

Accidental Shooting.

Accidentally discharging a revolver
while unloading it, Frank Parks, aged
38 years, a farmer of Walker town-
ship, is in a critical condition in the
Centre County Hospital, the bullet hav-
ing penetrated his chest.

The accident, which occurred at a late
hour Monday morning, happened while
Mr. Parks was packing household ar-
ticles preparatory to moving to Miles-
burg from the Earl Armstrong farm in
Little Nittany Valley. He was re-
moving the shells from the gun when
he accidentally pressed the trigger.

Park's condition on Wednesday morn-
ing was reported somewhat improved.

Pheasant Eggs Hatch 100 Per Cent.

After twenty-four and one-half days'
incubation, eight ringneck pheasant
eggs produced birds at the Kerlin
hatchery here. The birds are active
and of course, very pretty. The eggs,
as noted at the time, were found in a
nest along the railroad, the female bird
having been killed by a railroad tie
accidentally striking her.

The successful hatching of these eggs
induced Mr. Kerlin to give an order
for a hundred pheasant eggs of various
breeds which will be "set" as soon as
they are received.

by the company employing them.

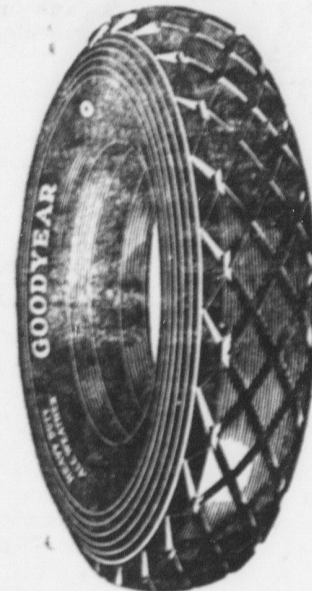
