The State Game Commission's an nouncement that ringneck pheas ant eggs could be furnished from its farms, brought such a flood of requests that the supply is already exhausted.


Miss Sarah Rearick, who taught the primary grade in the Centrel Hall public schools last school year, has been elected to a former school taught by her in Benner township.


