**WILL MAKE TESTS TO LEARN DEER DAMAGE**

**Fenced and Unfenced Areas Will Be Used for Obtaining Data—One Area in Seven Mountains.**

Arrangements have been completed between the Department of Forests and Waters and the Game Commission for setting aside a number of acres on State forest land for the purpose of investigating damage to trees caused by deer.

Two areas will be designated in the same locality, one fenced and the other unfenced. The unfenced areas will be definitely marked and the corner markers so concealed as not to cause undue influence upon the deer, either to scare them or arouse their curiosity.

The data will be collected by representatives of both departments and where planting is necessary the seedlings will be furnished from the State forest tree nurseries. One of the areas is to be located at Pine Grove Furnace in an open space where forest tree planting will be made inside and outside of the fence. White pine, Scotch pine, and Norway spruce will be planted. Another area will be in Clearfield county, near the Clearfield forest tree nursery in an area now heavily grazed by deer. A forest tree planting with the three above named species will be made. In this location particularly, it is desired to include if possible both within and without the fence, some area on which mountain laurel is found. Another area is to be located in the Seven Mountains in the Logan forest district, where planting is being conducted on both the open and closed areas. Another area will be chosen in the Pocono region in the Delaware forest district, and another in Potter county in the Susquehanna forest district, which will include natural tree growth and laurel. The fences surrounding the enclosed areas will be seven feet six inches in height and will enclose approximately an acre.

The Logan district lies west of the horse shoe curve on the concrete road over Seven Mountains.
