LANGUAGE EXPERT OF PENN STATE COLLEGE DIES

Dr. L. L. Foster, Author of Several Text Books, and Teacher of French to American Soldiers During War, Succumbs to Short Illness.

The Pennsylvania State College lost one of its most valuable faculty mempers in the death Saturday of Dr. I. L. Foster, head of the department of robeen all for a short time.

Dr. Foster, who served on the Penn State faculty for the past 34 years, vas one of the oldest employes of the ollege in point of service. He was 59 ears old. In 1893 f.e was graduated rom Brown University where Le taught for one year afterward and earned his naster's degree. Later he studied at the University of Leipzig. A year later he went to Penn State as instructor post until his death, with State and national Conors. He is author of a number of French textbooks used in

High schools and colleges. During the World War Dr. Foster used by American soldiers. He was stationed at Camp Hancock, Georgia, Buring 1917 nd 1918 as educational secretary and in charge of all French instruction there. He was a director of burg. the student Y. M. C. A. of the college for many years and was active in the organization and work of the "Cosmopolitan Club," composed of foreign students of the college.

Dr. Foster was the founder of the Penn State chapter of Phi Delta Theta. national society fraternity, of which he was faculty advisor until a short time ago when he resigned,
