LANGUAGE EXPERT OF PENN STATE COLLEGE DIES

Dr. I. L. Foster, Author of Several Text Books, and Teacher of French to American Soldiers During War, Succumbs to Short Illness.

The Pennsylvania State College lost one of its most valuable faculty members in the death Saturday of Dr. I. L. Foster, head of the department of romance language of the college. He had been ill for a short time.

Dr. Foster, who served on the Penn State faculty for the past 34 years, was one of the oldest employees of the college in point of service. He was 59 years old. In 1893 he was graduated from Brown University where he taught for one year afterward and earned his master's degree. Later he studied at the University of Leipzig. A year later he went to Penn State as instructor in romance languages. He became head of the department and held that post until his death, with State and national honors. He is author of a number of French textbooks used in high schools and colleges.

During the World War Dr. Foster compiled a book on "Practical French Conversation," that was extensively used by American soldiers. He was stationed at Camp Hancock, Georgia, during 1917 and 1918 as educational secretary and in charge of all French instruction there. He was a director of the student Y. M. C. A. of the college for many years and was active in the organization and work of the "Cosmopolitan Club," composed of foreign students of the college.

Dr. Foster was the founder of the Penn State chapter of Phi Delta Theta, national society fraternity, of which he was faculty advisor until a short time ago when he resigned.

Dr. Foster was born in Washington, D. C. He is survived by his widow, Nellie Patterson Foster, a brother, Dr. W. W. Foster, of Washington, D. C., and a sister, Mrs. J. G. Moore, of Chicago. Funeral services were held at his late residence at State College on Wednesday at 2 p. m.; burial in Pine Hill cemetery.

McCLELLAN—After an illness of about a month from flu and bronchial pneumonia, Mrs. Margaret Ethel, wife of Harry A. McClellan, died at her home at Tusseyville, near Tusseyville, Tuesday forenoon. Interment will be made in Zion Hill cemetery. Rev. W. E. Smith, of the Evangelical church, to officiate.

The deceased was a daughter of Thomas J. and Susan (Lockenbach) Fleisher, and was born Feb. 5, 1877, making her age 52 years, 2 months and 18 days. The husband and the following children also survive her: Miss Mae and Mrs. Ray Smith, Tusseyville; Hazel, at home; Franklin, State College; Stanley, Eugene and Dean, at home. Funeral services were held Saturday morning in the Lutheran church here; interment at Centre Hall.

MILLER—Frank Miller died at Altoona, on Sunday, aged about 55 years. He was a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Smith, his mother having been Mrs. Rachael Miller, a sister of Mr. Smith. There were no children, but he is survived by a wife, Mr. Smith was long employed in the P. R. R. shops at Altoona, and at the time of his death was a shop policeman.

RIPKA—Lavohn Marie Ripka, 11-month-old baby daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl S. Ripka, of State College, died Thursday afternoon of dropsy of the brain. Funeral services were held Friday morning with burial at Tusseyville cemetery.

GILLILAND—Dr. Samuel Howard Gilliland, 51 years old, president of the Gilliland Vaccine Laboratories, Marietta, died there, and on Thursday the remains were interred at State College, of which place he was a native. He was a veterinarian as well as a medical doctor and spent much of his time in research work and in the study of tuberculosis in animals as well as in the human family. Dr. Gilliland was at one time State Veterinarian and was also a director of the laboratories of the Department of Animal Industry of Pennsylvania. A widow and two daughters, Jane and Vittu, survive.

BLAZIER—Mrs. Carrie Blazier, wife of Philip Blazier, who makes his home with his nephew, Clarence E. Blazier, on the Barjes farm south of Centre Hall, died in the Altoona hospital of complications. She was a daughter of Henry Sholder, and was born November 23, 1830. She was a member of the Juniata Park church of the Brethren. Surviving are her husband, four daughters and three sons: Mrs. Gilbert Nall, Siglerville; Mrs. Lena Eckard, Lakemont Terrace; Mrs. John Gramm, Wolfborough; Mrs. John Gramm, Altoona; C. F. and J. L. Blazier, Antis; Homer Blazier, Bellwood. Funeral services were held at Juniata, in charge of the Rev. Ira Holsopple, followed by interment in Ashbury cemetery.

DEATHS

STUMP.—Mrs. Anna M. Stump was found dead in her bed at her home here on Sunday morning. She had been in poor health, but no one suspected that death was lurking so near. Her grandnephew, Harold Dunkle, who with her mother, Mrs. Eliza J. Stump, make up the family, spoke to her at about midnight and no complaint was made at that time.

The deceased was the only child of Reuben and Eliza J. (Smetzier) Stump, and was born east of town on the Foster farm. She was aged 58 years, 5 months and 19 days. Her husband, the late Samuel Stump, died the first of last August. There were no children, but the mother, previously named, survives her.

Funeral services were held from the home on Wednesday morning, conducted by Rev. Delas Keener, pastor of the deceased, and interment made in the cemetery at Centre Hall.

GUISEWITE—Luther Guisewite, for more than thirty years a boarding house and hotel proprietor in Harrisburg, died at his home in that city. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mary A. Guisewite; a daughter, Mrs. Grace E. Sedel; two grandchildren and a sister, Mrs. Elvina Brungard, of Hebersburg.

Mr. Guisewite was a native of Centre county, having been born in Haines township April 22, 1857, a son of John and Susan (Wolfe) Guisewite.

He was reared to agricultural pursuits, but later began lumbering, and still later embarked in the grain and produce business at Coburn. A fire wiped out his plant here, but it was rebuilt and he built up an extensive business with his grain, produce and creamery operations.

In 1885, he married Miss Mary Gramley, of Miles township, a daughter of Reuben Gramley. The union was blessed with a daughter, Grace, with whom the parents were living when the hand of death removed Mr. Guisewite.

Burial was made in Harrisburg.
