DEATHS

BRUNGART.—After an illness extending over a period of six months or more from pericarditis and contributory diseases, Cyrus Brungart passed away at his home here on Saturday forenoon. Interment was made in the cemetery here on Tuesday forenoon, services having been conducted in the Lutheran church by his pastor, Rev. S. F. Greenhoe.

Mr. Brungart was a son of Jacob and Sarah (Corman) Brungart and was born in Miles township. He was aged 77 years, 6 months and 13 days. His wife, who survives, was Miss Dolly Emerick. Two daughters, Mrs. J. S. Gotschell, of Uniontown, and Mrs. Thomas Keefe, of Youngwood, also survive him. Jeremiah Brungart, Ira Brungart, and Clayton Brungart, of Rebersburg, are surviving brothers, and Mrs. James West, of Aaronsburg, is a surviving sister.

Politically, Mr. Brungart was a Democrat and held the office of Sheriff of Centre county by the grace of the Democratic voters, from January 1st, 1900, to December 31st, 1903. Prior to that time he engaged in farming and later opened a meat market in Millheim. Shortly after retiring from office he located in Centre Hall. He succeeded the late W. B. Mingle as one of the borough justices of the peace, and continued in office until his death.

CURRAY.—William Augusta Curray, born in Harris township, a son of John Henry Curray, died at his home at Potters Mills, Wednesday of last week after an illness of some duration from hardening of the arteries and other ailments due to his advanced age. Interment was made at Centre Hall on Saturday morning, services having been conducted by Rev. Debas Keener. He was aged 79 years, 2 months and 5 days.

Mrs. Curray, who before marriage was Miss Elizabeth Fauble, is deceased. There were no children born to the union, but there were three adopted children. Mr. Curray came to Centre Hall about 1870, and opened a shoe shop in a small building located on the site where the Reporter building now stands. He was a fine mechanic and built many pairs of dress shoes and boots for men and boys. Later he built a home on West Church street, which place is now owned and occupied by Mrs. Belle Whiteman, and moved his work shop in the rear of it. Confinement began to tell on his health so he changed his occupation to that of farming, living as tenant farmer in various sections of Potter township, finally locating on one of the Allison farms at Potters Mills where he remained until he became incapacitated. He then moved to the home where he died.

BECKENBAGH.—Joseph R. Beckenbach, died at his home at Madisonburg, aged 72 years, 9 months and 12 days. A wife and six children survive him. The body was conveyed to Doyleburg, Franklin county, on Tuesday, by funeral director S. M. Campbell, where interment was made.

LONG.—Mrs. Charles P. Long, whose illness was noted repeatedly during her long illness, died Monday night at her home in Spring Mills. She was aged 68 years, 1 month and 19 days.

Mrs. Long was a daughter of Archibald and Margaret Jane (Gottis) Allison. Mr. Long, who survives her, September 7, 1887, and since then has resided at Spring Mills. The four children surviving are Mrs. R. H. Shook, Mrs. Mabel Musser, C. Austin Long, of Spring Mills, and C. E. Ostr, of Milesburg. One sister, Mrs. (Dr.) H. S. Braucht, Spring Mills, and two brothers, Harry Allison, Spring Mills, and Prof. A. M. Allison, of Chicago, Illinois, survive the deceased, as do also eight grandchildren.

Mrs. Long was a member of the Presbyterian church for 59 years, but recently united with the Spring Mills Methodist church. She was also a member of the Eastern Star and Corinth Shrine.

Funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the home; interment at Spring Mills. Rev. H. W. Newman, pastor of the Methodist church, will officiate.

DAUBERMAN.—Jonathan S. Dauberman, born in Centre county, a close relative of the John Dauberman and Mrs. Wm. Laska. The latter of near Egg Hill, died at Kaneville, Ill., at the age of 78 years, 11 months and 11 days. The Aurora Beacon-News refers to him as a most progressive farmer and citizen. He is survived by a wife and three children; also, two brothers—Ira S. of Peabody, Kas., and J. W., of Kaneville.

Harry R. Wolf, of near here, to whom the Reporter is indebted for the information given above, referred to Mr. Dauberman as "a father to me." For five years he was a member of his household.

THE CALF CLUB TOUR.

On Saturday, sixty Centre county boys and girls, parents and club sponsors under the direction of R. C. Blaney, county agent, accompanied a calf club tour into Union county to observe some of the club work conducted by the boys and girls in that county.

The last stop was made at the home of John Wehr below Mifflintown where there were three calf club members who exhibited and told about their calves. At this stop Prof. Welch, of State College, gave a fitting demonstration and showed the Centre county members how to get their heifers ready to show at the round-up. In addition to the fitting contest a judging contest was conducted by Mr. Welch for both the boys and their dads. The winner of the adults was S. B. Wasson, of State College, who was presented a prize by H. L. Ebsright, of Centre Hall, key banker for Centre county. Prizes were presented to Earl Cori, of State College, and Kenneth Ishler, of Bellefonte, who were high scores of their respective groups. The four highest in the contest were selected as a judging team to represent Centre county in the State wide contest to be held at State College June 19th, and they are as follows: Kenneth Ishler, score, 88.5; James Biddle, Bellefonte, score, 81.7; Earl Cori, State College, score 78.5; Eugene Homan, State College, score 68.4. The first three names mentioned will compose the team and the fourth will be the alternate. He will judge as an individual in the contest.
