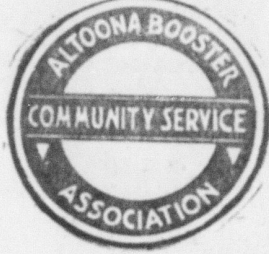


POTTERS MILLS.
