FROM CAMP KENESATAKE ON SPRUCE CREEK

176 Girls of Grammar School Age Quartered in Twenty-five Cabins—Improvements to Camp Grounds.

This is from Camp Kenesatake, on Spruce Creek, date of opening, Monday, June 17th, and is to my young friends who read the Reporter. Right at the start is my trouble,—where will I begin about telling of this wonderful camp furnished us by the Sunday schools of Pennsylvania. The men really responsible for this camp are R. A. Zentmeyer, of Tyrone, deceased, a civil engineer; O. H. Meyers, treasurer of Juniata College, Huntingdon, and Ives L. Harvey, town clerk of Centre county. After the camp was started, the State Sabbath School Association took it over and made it what it now is.

There are here this week 176 girls of Grammar school age. This is about fifty more than were here last year. We are located in twenty-five cabins, and each cabin has its leader. The leaders are wonderful. Our leader in Cabin No. 7 is Anna Harmon, of Grove City, Mercer county. The girls in the cabin with me are Grace Buskang, Little; Jean Robok, Keisterville; Jennie Dye, Velmha Gingersch and Esther Spitz.

It is too early to tell about the camp work and studies, so I will mention the improvements made since last year. The first change noticed was an "eye-ful" of mason work. Out of dark blue limestone was built a stairway leading from the bottom to the top of the big knoll on which the camp is located. There are about forty steps, and ten or eleven landings. On each landing are two pillars about 3 (3 ft.) high. It is a very imposing, massive piece of work and was built as a memorial to Mr. Zentmeyer.

The electric current now comes from the Penn. Central Power Company. Last year it was generated on the "hill." One big pump now takes the place of the two small ones that pump the water into a reservoir and from there flows to all parts of the camp. In the large dining hall is a new range on which our grub is cooked. It is a monster and up to date. Wood for fuel. A lot of new mattresses for our cots, new cutlery and cooking utensils, etc., make for our better comfort, while the concrete swimming pool creates one of the great joys these hot days.

Rev. E. H. Bonsall is the head of the camp, while Adela Sterrett is his associate and really has us in charge. It is her first year here. The board of directors are O. R. Myers, chairman; E. Rodgers, Tyrone; H. C. Heckerman, Bedford; I. L. Foster (deceased), Mrs. Easton, Stroudsburg, and E. H. Bonsall. Mr. Myers is also chairman of the administration board. The other members are Mr. Bonsall, Mr. McGarvey, W. E. Myers, secretary of the State Sunday School Association, and Mr. Heckerman. The last named is secretary of the board, and prepares the program and curriculum—the course of studies. With me in camp from dear old C. H. are Bettie Ebright and Loraine Brungart. "BILLIE" B.
