**Sheffield Milk Prices Highest May, Price in History of Association.**

The net cash price to be paid members of the Sheffield Producers Cooperative Association, Inc., for the milk sold by them in the month of May, 1929, is \$2.36 1/2 per hundred pounds for three per cent Grade B milk in the 201-210 mile zone, with the usual freight, grade and butterfat differentials. This is equivalent to \$2.56 1/2 for milk sold on a 3.5 basis. It is 22 cents higher than the price paid in May of last year and is the highest price ever paid for May milk. Checks were in producers hands by June 15. Indications are that the campaign for increased production of milk for

November is meeting with success.
