Mrs. Frazier developed phlebotis but without pain until her death. A very high fever resulted, and at times it ran as high as 107°-110° degrees. During her most serious illness she was conscious nearly all of the time and was in the best of spirits.

Mrs. Frazier was born November 4, 1900, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Child. She attended Perry and Painesville schools and was graduated from Painesville High with the class of 1919. She attended Oberlin Conservatory of Music. She was talented on the piano and organ.
