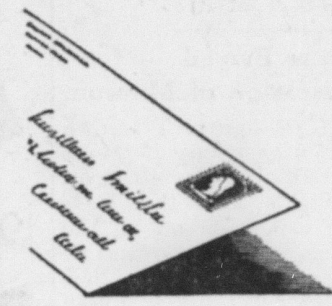
The Children's Day exercises at Linden Hall were enjoyable and profitable.

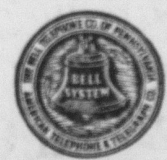
