BOOB.—Robert Benjamin Boob, one of Aaronburg's aged and respected citizens, passed away at his home there of paralysis.

Mr. Boob was a son of Adam and Susanna (Adams) Boob and was born near Laurelton, Union county, and was aged 83 years, 6 months and 21 days.

Surviving are his three sons—W. W. Boob, formerly of Centre Hall but now of Los Angeles, Cal.; Louis E. Boob, of Akron, Ohio, and Clyde E. Boob, proprietor of a restaurant in Millheim; also these brothers and sisters: Nathaniel Boob, one of Millheim's two remaining Civil War veterans; Isaiah Boob, of Woodward; Mrs. Maria Kestler, of Millburg; Mrs. Amanda Smith, of Bunkertown; and Frank Boob, of Laurelton. His wife, who was Sarah Sherry, died some years ago.

Funeral services were held from the late home of the deceased and continued in the Aaronburg Lutheran church, the Rev. Louis V. Leshier officiating, assisted by Rev. H. C. Kieffel. Interment was made in the Aaronburg Lutheran cemetery.

BEAVER.—Thomas G. Beaver, a well known newspaper writer, politician and telegraph operator in Mifflin county, fell dead in Harrisburg, Wednesday noon of last week, while conversing with Nevin Dietrich, personal secretary in the cabinet of Governor John S. MOWERY.—James Edward Mowery aged 45 years, 4 months and 24 days, died at his home, McKinley trolley station, The Pike, Burnham, Friday morning. He was a medical patient at the Lewistown hospital several times and returned to his home recently. A complication of diseases caused his death.

He leaves his wife, whose maiden name was Miss Beulah McNIET, and two sons and one daughter, George and Edward Mowery, at their parental home, and Mrs. Willis Snook, Burnham.

Mr. Mowery was a son of George W. Mowery, deceased, and of Mrs. Jennie (Garis) Mowery, now residing in Lewistown. The parents of the deceased prior to locating at Burnham lived in Centre Hall.

During the last five or more years Mr. Mowery was employed at the gas filling station of Walter Glass, Burnham. Previously he was an employee of the Logan Iron and Steel company.

DAVIDSON.—Mrs. Sarah Amelia Davidson, widow of Lewis H. Davidson, passed away at her home, Milroy, Tuesday of last week, aged 88 years, 2 months and 23 days. The cause of her death was infirmities of old age after an illness of three months.

The maiden name of the deceased was Miss Sarah Amelia McCool, a daughter of Jacob and Rachael (Greig) McCool, both deceased, who resided in Centre county. She was a relative of James H. McCool, of Potter township. The husband of the deceased preceded her in death 30 years ago.

(Lloyd) Alexander, Milroy, and Mrs. Amor (Bessie) Mowery, who resided with the deceased at her home in Milroy. One sister also survives, Miss Mary McCool, Milroy. Fall Fatal to Linman.

John Albert Treaster, aged 32 years, died at the Lewistown hospital Thursday of injuries sustained when he fell from a telephone pole near Port Royal while employed as a lineman for the American Telephone and Telegraph Co.

The deceased is survived by his wife, who before her marriage was Mrs. Jennie Russler, a sister of Mrs. M. A. Burkholder, of near town. He was the son of Walter Treaster and the late Bertha Camp Treaster, and was born and spent the early part of his life at Milroy. For the past number of years he has resided in Lewistown.

Funeral services were held on Monday; interment at Milroy.

Tragic Death of Lock Haven Man.

Henry Lesh, 76 years, for the past eleven years a resident of Lock Haven, was found dead Sunday morning about 7 o'clock, near the home of his niece, Mrs. Charles Englert, of Altoona, with a gunshot wound in his head.

Authorities have not yet determined whether he was murdered or took his own life.

Mr. Lesh, a native of Zion, this county, was a brother of Thomas Lesh, of Lock Haven. The body was brought to the home of his niece, Mrs. John Daugherty, of Lock Haven, where funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon. Interment was made in the Zion cemetery.

It was decided to hold the 1930 reunion at the Rearick homestead in Georges Valley.

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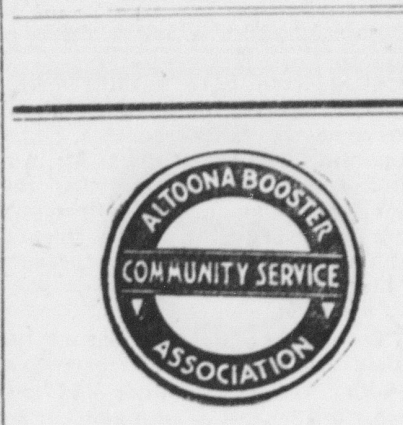
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Young-McClellan.
