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The closing of the Near East Relief marks the passing of one of the most stupendous humanitarian agencies the

world has ever known. It was organized to relieve the misery and suffering caused by the world war. As a result of the geographical re-alignment of many countries thousands of people were compelled to migrate to other places and seek employment under conditions wholly new to them. As a result, millions of people were plunged into a condition of hunger and disease and thousands upon thousands of children were made orphans by the death of their parents or being separated from them. Most of these were in the countries of the Near East. In closing up the work the organi-

zation reports that during the period of its activity 1,500,000 lives were saved 133,000 children rescued from death, 12,500,000 persons in famine districts fed and 6,000,000 persons given medical aid. Total donations from the time it was organized in 1915 to June of this year totaled \$108,655,663, not including the enormous donations of food, clothling, medical supplies and other articles. These figures are staggering. The human mind can scarcely grasp their significance. As Dr. Barton, in his closing report, well says: "It was the outstanding demonstration of good will and benevolence in history.'

And the most gratifying feature of this great undertaking is the fact that it was organized in the United States and that practically all of the contributions both in money and other acticles came from the people of America."
