BOALSBURG MAN REPORTS ROBBERY ON HIGHWAY

Harold Fisher, of Boalsburg, reported to the State Highway patrolman that he had been robbed of \$50.00 in cash, on Monday between the hours of 1:00 and 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon. He stated the robbery to have occurred at or near the watering trough along the State Highway over Nittany Mountain. Mr. Fisher told the patrolman that as he was coming along the road a that point he saw a Packard sedan with the hood up and two men apparently examining the engine. One of the men signaled him to stop, which he did, when he was asked whether he knew anything about a car. Mr. Fisher says he told them he might be able to help them, and one of the two strangers suggested he believed the trouble to be in the carburetor, and while he (Fisher) was looking over this part of the machine, a gun was poked into his ribs, then he was relieved of his \$50.00 wallet. Next the spark plugs were removed from his Ford car, and presto—the men disappeared in the Packard. It is claimed the car bore a New York license, but Fisher says he drifted to Pleasant Gap, got spark plugs and then gave the information to the patrolmen. The patrolmen, it appears, have not made any corroborative discoveries.

JAM UP OF AUTOS AT THE VEILED LADY CAVERN

At the junction of the private road leading from Route No. 95 to Veiled Lady Cavern, east of Centre Hall, on Sunday afternoon, two cars jammed together, causing a hearing before Justice J. L. Tresselt to extend from Monday evening to an early morning hour of the next day. The principals were Recorder Lloyd Stover, of Bellefonte, and C. W. Davis, of Milton, both of whom were charged by a State highway patrolman with reckless driving. His own testimony and that given by a part of the nineteen witnesses heard at the hearing, resulted in the discharge of Mr. Stover. Mr. Davis was less fortunate in persuading the court that he had conformed to the conventionalities of the highway. He was fined \$10.00 and costs.

It appears Mr. Stover, following two cars headed for the same pace, was going east and on reaching the road junction the two cars ahead negotiated the left-hand turn successfully, but his car was hit by that driven westward by Mr. Davis. Mr. Davis claimed Mr. Stover omitted giving a proper signal, while Mr. Stover vowed he had. And so the tearing, and, the fine.

Sheffield Milk Prices.

The net cash price to be paid the more than 12,000 members of the Sheffield Producers Co-operative Association, Inc., for the milk sold by them in the month of July, 1929, is \$2.37 1/2 per hundred pounds for three per cent Grade B milk in the 201-210 milk zone with the usual freight, grade and butterfat differentials. This is equivalent to \$2.57 1/2 for milk sold on a 2.5 basis. It is 1 1/2 cents higher than the price paid in June. This July price is the same as the price paid in July 1928, which was then the highest price ever paid for July milk. Checks will be to producers' lands by today (Thursday).

FIRST VOCATIONAL PROJECT TOUR WELL ATTENDED

A large number of boys enrolled in Vocational Agriculture at Boalsburg, Spring Mills, and boys attending classes conducted by Mr. Jeffries, together with students from State College Summer Session; H. C. Pettehoff, of the State Department of Public Instruction; County Agent R. C. Blaney; H. G. Parkinson and Wm. F. Hall, of Pennsylvania State College, met at the Gregg Township Vocational School last Wednesday morning prepared to spend the day visiting with boys and their projects. Many of the boys were accompanied by their fathers who took interest in the work observed. Several projects were visited at Spring Mills and Boalsburg, as follows:

At Spring Mills—Robert Steigle—Home Improvement. John Zubler—Corn (2 acres.) Bieber Bishel—Dairy (10 cows.) Wm. Campbell—Sheep (85 ewes.) Wm. Campbell—Swine (10 brood sows.) Russell Mark—150 Laying Hens.

At Boalsburg—William Ross—Swine (4 pigs.) Robert Ross—Potatoes (1 acre.) Oscar Smith—Poultry (200 chickens.) Montgomery Hubler—Corn (2 acres.)

The trip was so planned that Centre Hall was reached by noon where lunch had been arranged for at Homan's restaurant.

This trip was the first of its kind ever conducted and proved to be very interesting as well as beneficial from an educational standpoint. Plans are under way for a trip of similar type next year.

After lunch the group stopped at Grange Park for a short time where Mr. Pettehoff and Mr. Blaney gave short talks. Mr. Pettehoff spoke chiefly of projects and their value. He stated that last year the net profits from projects in the State was approximately \$194,000. Mr. Blaney briefly explained the opportunity for boys and girls in club work and the development of the Grange Encampment and Fair as the only one of its kind in the whole United States.
