AS A RESULT of the continued drought in the wheat growing sections of the United States, the total crop for 1929 is estimated at from 750,000,000 to 800,000.000 bushels, as compared with 902,000-000 bushels recorded by the Bureau of Agricultural Ecnomics for 1928. The estimated loss is over 100,000,000 bushels.

THE AVERAGE PRICE to be received, as indicated at present will probably be between \$1.40 and \$1.50 per bushel. Multiplying the price, as at present indicated, by the average of the estimates for the total amount of wheat to be produced, it is found that the wheat farmers, as a whole, will receive approximately \$100,000.000 more in 1929 than in 1928..
