**WHEAT CROP SHRINKS**  
AS A RESULT of the continued drought in the wheat growing sections of the United States, the total crop for 1929 is estimated at from 750,000,000 to 800,000,000 bushels, as compared with 902,000,000 bushels recorded by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics for 1928. The estimated loss is over 100,000,000 bushels.  
THE AVERAGE PRICE to be received, as indicated at present will probably be between \$1.40 and \$1.50 per bushel. Multiplying the price, as at present indicated, by the average of the estimates for the total amount of wheat to be produced, it is found that the wheat farmers, as a whole, will receive approximately \$100,000,000 more in 1929 than in 1928.

**NEW TELEPHONE LINE SERVES HOOVER CAMP**  
President's Rapidan River Retreat Now Connected With Rest of World.  
From the refuge of his fishing camp along the Rapidan River in the mountains of Virginia, President Hoover, during week-end visits to this isolated spot, where he seeks relief from official duties at Washington, now has access to the long-distance lines of the Bell Telephone System, which enable him to establish contact with any section of the country.  
It was necessary to construct about fifteen miles of pole line from Madison, Va., to the camp site and to string two copper wire circuits from Orange, Va. From Orange to Washington, circuits were made available on an existing line of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.  
Developments in any part of the world can be communicated to the President and his guests within a few minutes after they are reported to the executive offices in Washington.
