NEW BUILDINGS FOR PENN STATE OPENING

When the Pennsylvania State College opens for its 71st year on Wednesday, September 25, three new buildings will be ready for use by the student body of more than 4000.

A new engineering administration building stands just inside the main campus gateway on the site of the old building destroyed by fire eleven years ago. It is designed to accommodate the administrative offices and faculty members of the School of Engineering, and its upper floors will be devoted to classrooms and the work of the department of architecture. It fills a long-felt need in this school.

Room for some of the overcrowded conditions that have existed for years in the school of Chemistry and Physics is given in the completion of a second wing of the G. G. Pond Chemistry Laboratory. This new structure is modernly fitted in every respect.

A third building to be opened is the new Grange Memorial dormitory for girls. It is the headhouse in a projected dormitory until later in the fall. A new botany building will be finished in December or January. All these buildings have been provided through gift funds and the 1927 State legislative appropriation.

Jacobs, of Lena, Illinois. Among the deceased brothers was the late Dr. W. A. Jacobs, who died in Centre Hall.

COURT NEWS.

Court convened Monday morning with the Honorable M. Ward Fleming on the Bench. After hearing quite a number of motions and petitions, taking returns on Tuesday forenoon, prior to burial at Boalsburg. She was aged about 74 years.

The first criminal case taken up was Comm. vs. Grover G. Walker. Indicted on a statutory charge. Prosecutrix, Rosemond Frank. The defendant plead guilty and the usual sentence was imposed.

Comm. vs. Jack Zavada, prosecutrix, Susie Kadash. Indicted on statutory charge. The jury rendered a verdict of guilty and the usual sentence was imposed.

Comm. vs. John Rudy; violation of liquor laws and auto laws; prosecutrix, A. E. Yougel. This case is from State College, or Lytle's Addition. The defendant plead guilty and sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution and fine of \$25.00 and under probation.

Comm. vs. John Gilliland. There being two cases against this defendant, the one for operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated; prosecutrix, C. A. Zarger. The other for violation of the motor laws, prosecutrix, A. E. Yougel. The defendant plead guilty on both of these charges and was sentenced on the first charge to pay the costs of prosecution and a fine of \$200, and undergo probation for period of three years, and on the second charge sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution.

Comm. vs. Grace Koch; violation of liquor laws; prosecutrix, A. E. Yougel. This case is from Lytle's Addition and was tried on Tuesday forenoon. Verdict rendered of not guilty and the prosecutrix to pay the costs.

Comm. vs. C. G. St. Clair and Mrs. C. G. St. Clair. Prosecutrix, P. C. Frank. This case is from Potter township and the prosecutrix, being a constable, was serving an execution process from the office of a Justice of the Peace and was interfered with by the defendants. The defendants plead guilty and were sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution and undergo probation for three months.

Comm. vs. Earl Walte, charged with obstructing justice in not appearing as a witness before a Justice of the Peace. Prosecutrix, J. L. Tressel, J. P. The defendant plead guilty and sentenced to pay costs of prosecution and under probation for three months.

Comm. vs. same, charged with resisting an officer; prosecutrix, J. J. McDonnell. The Court directed a not. pros. and the county to pay the costs.

Comm. vs. Raymond Carson, charged with pointing fire arms; prosecutrix, Martin Dunlap. This case is from Taylor township and went to trial and verdict rendered of not guilty and prosecutrix to pay costs.

Comm. vs. Earl Lucas, indicted for violation of motor law in operating a motorcycle while under the influence of liquor. Prosecutrix, A. C. Glosser, State Highway patrolman. Defendant plead guilty and sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, fine of \$50.00 and committed to county jail for period of sixty days.

Prosecutrix, Leo Boden, county detective. True bill. Comm. vs. John Sayer; indicted, first count assault and battery; second count, indecent assault. Prosecutrix, Mrs. Merrill Heverly. The assault is alleged to have been committed on a minor daughter of the prosecutrix in Curtin township. Verdict of not guilty and costs to be paid one-half by the prosecutrix and one-half by the defendant. Comm. vs. Minnie Crawshaw, indicted for violation of liquor laws. Verdict of guilty and defendant sentenced to pay costs, fine of \$200, and three months in Allegheny county work house. Comm. vs. George H. Myers, violation of liquor laws. Verdict of guilty. Comm. vs. Leonard Bryan, indicted for operating motor vehicle after revocation of his operator's license. Defendant plead guilty and sentenced to pay costs, fine of \$100 and placed on probation. Comm. vs. McKinley Corigan, indicted for assault and battery; prosecutrix, Viola Corigan, his wife. Verdict of not guilty and prosecutrix pay one-half the costs and defendant one-half. Comm. vs. Joan Carner, indicted for larceny of a harrow, etc. Prosecutrix, Leonard Griffin. Case from Patton township. Verdict of not guilty. Comm. vs. Ralph Bote, Edward Finkle, Perry Hoover, Albert Auman and Wilbur Confer; indicted for accessories after the fact. Prosecutrix, Walter Powell, State Police. These defendants came into Court and all five of them entered a plea of nolle prosequere. The cases grew out of the robbing of the tea hunting camps by Mode Auman and Newton Lingie, and these defendants, at the request of the wife of Mode Auman, moved the goods away from the Auman home, after the statement of facts to the court and the defendants' statements who admitted the fact, Mode Auman and Newton Lingie were called for sentence and both of them sentenced to pay costs of prosecution and fine of \$100 and undergo imprisonment in the Western Penitentiary for not less than five nor more than ten years.
